Mark's gospel ends very abruptly, even with an incomplete sentence. While Mark certainly did intend to end where he did, others were not content with his ending. Several endings have been added. Today we'll look at several of the most common. We'll see where they came from and how they have been used.

Prelude and Announcements

P: Alleluia! Christ is risen.

P: Refreshed by the resurrection life we share in Christ, let us give thanks for the gift of baptism.

The worship leader stands by the baptismal font. Water may be poured into it.

P: We thank you, risen Christ,

for these waters where you make us new,

leading us from death to life, from tears to joy.

We bless you, risen Christ, that your Spirit comes to us in the grace-filled waters of rebirth, like rains to our thirsting earth. like streams that revive our souls. like cups of cool water shared with strangers.

C: Breathe your peace on your church when we hide in fear. Clothe us with your mercy and forgiveness. Send us as companions on our journey as we share your life.

P: Make us one, risen Christ.

Cleanse our hearts.

Shower us with life.

C: To you be given all praise, with the Holy Sprit, in the glory of God, now and forever.

P: The grace of our Lord Jesus Christ, the love of God, and the communion of the Holy Spirit be with you all.

C: And also with you.

Gathering Dialog (Romans 10)

P: The word is near you,

P: If you confess with your lips that Jesus is Lord,

C: and believe in your heart that God raised him from the dead, you will be saved.

First Reading 1 Corinthians 15:3-10

B: [Paul writes:] For I handed on to you as of first importance what I in turn had received: that Christ died for our sins in accordance with the scriptures, ⁴and that he was buried, and that he was raised on the third day in accordance with the scriptures, ⁵and that he appeared to Cephas, then to the twelve. ⁶Then he appeared to more than five hundred brothers and sisters at one time, most of whom are still alive, though some have died. ⁷Then he appeared to James, then to all the apostles. ⁸Last of all, as to one untimely born, he appeared also to me. ⁹For I am the least of the apostles, unfit to be called an apostle, because I persecuted the church of God. ¹⁰But by the grace of God I am what I am, and his grace toward me has not been in vain. On the contrary, I worked harder than any of them—though it was not I, but the grace of God that is with me.

After the reading the reader may say: The Word of the Lord

C: Thanks be to God.

Scripture Poetry Psalm 33:4-22 (read responsively)

D: The word of the Lord is true: what God says, God does.

C: This lover of truth and justice

fills the earth with love.

D: God speaks: the heavens are made; God breathes: the stars shine.

C: God bottles the waters of the sea and stores them in the deep.

D: All earth, be astounded, stand in awe of God.

C: God speaks: the world is; God commands: all things appear.

D: God blocks the plans of nations, disrupts all they contrive.

C: But God's plan and designs last from age to age.

D: Blest is the land whose god is the Lord, the heirs whom God has chosen.

C: The Lord looks down and sees our human kind.

D: From heaven God surveys all peoples on earth.

C: The maker of human hearts knows every human act.

D: Armies do not save kings, brute force does not spare soldiers.

C: The warhorse is a sham; despite its power, it will not save.

D: God keeps a loving eye on all who believe, on those who count on God

C: to bring relief from famine, to rescue them from death.

D: With all we are, we wait for God, the Lord, our help, our shield.

C: Our hearts find joy in the Lord; we trust God's holy name.

D: Love us, Lord! We wait for you.

Second Reading 2 Timothy 3:14-17

E: As for you, continue in what you have learned and firmly believed, knowing from whom you learned it, ¹⁵ and how from childhood you have known the sacred writings that are able to instruct you for salvation through faith in Christ Jesus. ¹⁶All scripture is inspired by God and is

useful for teaching, for reproof, for correction, and for training in righteousness, ¹⁷so that everyone who belongs to God may be proficient, equipped for every good work.

After the reading the reader may say: The Word of the Lord

C: Thanks be to God.

Gospel Acclamation (John 20:29)

C: Alleluia. Blessed are those who have not seen and yet have come to believe. Alleluia

Endings Added to Mark's Gospel

A: The "shorter ending". This shows up in manuscripts as early as the 3rd century:

And all that had been commanded them they told briefly to those around Peter. And afterward Jesus himself sent out through them, from east to west, the sacred and imperishable proclamation of eternal salvation.

B: The "longer ending". References to this ending go as far back as the 2^{nd} century:

⁹Now after he rose early on the first day of the week, he appeared first to Mary Magdalene, from whom he had cast out seven demons. ¹⁰She went out and told those who had been with him, while they were mourning and weeping. ¹¹But when they heard that he was alive and had been seen by her, they would not believe it.

¹²After this he appeared in another form to two of them, as they were walking into the country. ¹³And they went back and told the rest, but they did not believe them.

¹⁴Later he appeared to the eleven themselves as they were sitting at the table; and he upbraided them for their lack of faith and stubbornness, because they had not believed those who saw him after he had risen. ¹⁵And he said to them, "Go into all the world and proclaim the good news to the whole creation. ¹⁶The one who believes and is baptized will be saved; but the one who does not believe will be condemned. ¹⁷And these signs will accompany those who believe: by using my name they will cast out demons; they will speak in new tongues; ¹⁸they will pick up snakes in their hands, and if they drink any deadly thing, it will not hurt them; they will lay their hands on the sick, and they will recover." ¹⁹So then the Lord Jesus, after he had spoken to them, was taken up into heaven and sat down at the right hand of God. ²⁰And they went out and proclaimed the good news everywhere, while the Lord worked with them and confirmed the message by the signs that accompanied it.

D: The "Freer Logion" is a rare insertion after verse 14 of the longer ending. The oldest copy of the Bible with these verses is from the early 5th century. It is on display in the Freer Gallery at the Smithsonian Institution:

And they excused themselves, saying, "This age of lawlessness and unbelief is under Satan, who does not allow the truth and power of God to prevail over the unclean things of this spirits. Therefore reveal your righteousness now" – thus they spoke to Christ. And Christ replied to them, "The term of years of Satan's power has been fulfilled, but other terrible things draw near. And for those who have sinned I was handed over to death, that they may return to the truth and sin no more, that they may inherit the spiritual and imperishable glory of righteousness that is in heaven."

On the third day he rose again; he ascended into heaven, he is seated at the right hand of the Father, and he will come to judge the living and the dead.

I believe in the Holy Spirit, the holy catholic church, the communion of saints the forgiveness of sins, the resurrection of the body, and the life everlasting. Amen.

E: If anyone is in Christ, there is a new creation:

C: Everything old has passed away;

behold, everything has become new! (2 Corinthians 5:17)

P: Into your hands, gracious God, we commend all for whom we pray, trusting in your mercy; through Jesus Christ our Savior.

C: Amen.


