# Pastor's Paragraphs

My email inbox is again receiving a message purported to be from Franklin Graham (son of Billy Graham) about the future of America. I say "again" and "purported" because, though it claims to be recent, various versions of this email have been circulating since 2012. While Franklin Graham has indeed lamented the rise of secular humanism, he does not preach the racist and sexist messages this email claims.

There's nothing new about taking a few authentic words from a famous person and adding them to something they would never say. It's been done for millennium. But it does raise the question of how do you know what is true and what is not? The internet can be a fast and easy way to fact check something. But after doing a bit of fact checking on the Franklin Graham message I discovered that some sites have been created for the purpose of perpetuating the lie! Deceptions can have many layers. There's also nothing new about that!

Our Christian faith is built upon the truth and authority of God. We say that the word of God is the Bible. Though the Bible is an ancient, complex, and even self-contradictory collection of writings, it is the rule and norm for our faith. We do not hide the Bible away in some secret room and say only an elite few can access it. No, everyone can have their own copy. No one is allowed to add to it. No one is allowed to subtract from it. Anyone and everyone is welcome to read it and interpret it. Or perhaps I should say 'attempt' to interpret it. There are some passages that leave even the most astute biblical scholars scratching their heads! My point is that ultimate truth is open and available to you.

As we enter the season of Easter we focus on the resurrection of Jesus. That is a huge -and scientifically impossible – claim to make. Since the Bible is our only source for such a claim does that toss out any authority we may claim for our scripture? Not at all. That can actually give us a path for interpretation.

Five different authors in the Bible claim the historic reality of the resurrection of Jesus (Paul, Matthew, Mark, Luke, John). Having five sources proves nothing. They could all be conspiring in a deception after all. But it is that each of the five claims it while also struggling with the impossibility of it all. The Bible's authority for our lives is not in demanding that we accept miracles without question. Nor is it by claiming it to have absolute answers to complex problems. The Bible's authority for our lives is that it takes us into the faith struggles of those who have gone before us. The Bible is not something you read through once, learn, and then apply. It is something you return to again and again; bringing to it your life and its issues over and over. There you find witnesses to God's love and God's grace. There you find the truth to judge all other things – including purported truths from the internet! Blessings, Dester Len


2. Only one person who is healed in Mark's gospel is named. His name is? Answer: Bartimaeus (Mark 10:46)
