### Pastor's Paragraphs

Despite the valiant efforts of every English teacher I've ever had, I've never mastered the use of commas. Where do they go? When are you supposed to use them? Do they matter at all?

Well, yes, of course they matter! Even though I'm sure I'll never master their use, those little symbols can sway the meaning of a sentence tremendously. Consider this sentence from Luke's gospel. Jesus is speaking to the criminal beside him at the crucifixion.

"Truly I tell you today you will be with me in Paradise." (Luke 23:43) Where should the comma go? Most translators put it after "you". Like this:

"Truly I tell you, today you will be with me in Paradise." That suggests that that very day the criminal will be with Jesus in Paradise.

But not all translators agree with that placement. Let's move the comma one word farther along: "Truly I tell you today, you will be with me in Paradise." Now the sentence has taken on a very different meaning. (Perhaps it's more clear if it's forced into two sentences: "Truly I tell you today. You will be with me in Paradise."

While scholars debate this, I believe the comma belongs after "today". Twice before in Luke's gospel Jesus has used "today" to refer to his power right then and there. In 4:21 he says to the hometown crowd of Nazareth, "Today this scripture has been fulfilled in your hearing." And in 19:9 he tells the Zacchaeus, "Today salvation has come to this house."

Telling the criminal that "today" he would be with Jesus in Paradise also doesn't fit with Luke's understanding of time. For Luke, as is the case of most of the Bible's authors, time is only relevant to the living. Once you have died you are beyond the bounds of time. For Jesus to say the criminal would be with him in Paradise today makes no sense. I believe the point of the passage is to show the criminal's incredible trust in Jesus despite all evidence to the contrary on that day. You certainly wouldn't believe a criminal's promises made on the day of his/her execution! And yet this guy hanging beside Jesus does!

This criminal's faith is radical. He is seeing something in Jesus that is deeper than circumstances would suggest. This criminal realizes Jesus is powerful because, despite being innocent, he dies willingly.

As we approach Holy Week in April I hope that we all can see that God works in ways that do not fit with appearances. Or perhaps are even contrary to appearances. Where we see shame God sees wholeness. Where we see loss God can see triumph. Where we see death God is at work bringing about life. That is truly resurrection faith!

### 8:30 Breakfast Church during Lent

Our 8:30 worship service will explore a "breakfast church" model during the season of Lent. Tables will be set up in the back of the sanctuary. Worship will begin with a hymn and a prayer. Then worshippers will serve themselves whatever delicious breakfast foods have been prepared for that morning. As they eat the scriptures will be read. There won't be so much of a sermon as an interactive reflection on the gospel reading. The service will wrap up with prayers and song. When there is communion it will be incorporated right into the meal.

This is rooted in Psalm 141 which reads, "Let my prayer rise up like incense before you."
