Pastor's Paragraphs

I think I can safely assume that you've never gone into a restaurant, ordered, and when they food arrives exclaimed, "Yummy! A plate full of vegetables!

While our tastes regarding vegetables probably varies from "yuck" to "good" I doubt any of us would choose a plate full of vegetables if we knew it was to be our last meal. We'd want to end our life on something much more luscious.

Yet we eat our vegetables anyway. They're good for us. We may not eat as many servings per day as nutritionists would suggest, but we do know their importance. I admit that I don't really like vegetables at all. For me they vary from yuck to tolerably satisfying. But none excite me. Yet over the years I've learned that if I was to feel satisfied I have to eat them. If I fill up on the things I crave most – things that are fatty, salty, or sweet – my taste buds are happy. But my overall body is never really satisfied. If I want true satisfaction from eating I need to include the healthy stuff.

With Holy Week just a few days ahead of us, I think it is a lot like eating vegetables. It is easy to go from the sweetness of Jesus' triumphal entry on Palm Sunday to the sweetness of Easter Sunday. But are our spirit's really fed? Do we get a lasting satisfaction? No. We've gone from dessert to dessert. We've skipped the wholesome nutrients we need.

I know that for many of us Holy Week is just one more week that is too busy. Our jobs, our kids' activities, and our doctors' appointments keep us going and going and going. We don't need to cram in something else. When the church wants to throw in the suggestion of long daily Bible readings, plus a couple mid-week worship services, we just don't have the energy for it.

Plus, let's face it. The topics of Holy Week are depressing. Jesus is being stalked by the religious leaders, who are looking for a way to catch him and get rid of him. The disciple Judas does eventually does sell him out. The disciple Peter, perhaps Jesus' closest follower, denies that he even knows Jesus. And Jesus himself gets arrested, tried, and executed. Who wants that meal of vegetables?!? And yet we need them if we are to be satisfied. The joy of the resurrection cannot come if you skip over the fact of Jesus' death.

I encourage you to prioritize Holy Week so that it can give you the spiritual nutrients that you need. Elsewhere in the newsletter are suggested Bible readings for each day of Holy Week. We've been reading them in worship, but I suggest reading them day by day during Holy Week as well. Feel the journey Jesus is on. Understand the tension he is facing. See how it all falls apart. Of course consider coming to the special worship services on Maundy Thursday and Good Friday. They are the days when things really start to happen.

That'll put you in a good place to enjoy the dessert of Easter. For Easter is more joyous when we've had a meal of spiritual satisfaction leading up to it! Blessings,


Adult Sunday School
