The Prophets — "1st Isaiah" August 22, 2021 10:30 Service of the Word

Isaiah is the second largest book of the Bible. Its 66 chapters appear to a compilation of work from multiple authors living over a few centuries. Isaiah is generally broken into three sections: 1st Isaiah includes the words of the original prophet Isaiah and comprises chapters 1-39. 2nd Isaiah was written during the exile and goes from chapter 40 to 55. Third Isaiah comes from after the exile and covers chapters 56-66. Today we will look at the words of the original prophet Isaiah. His words were stinging to the people of his time, and they are still stinging words today.

First Reading Isaiah 6

B: In the year that King Uzziah died, I saw the Lord sitting on a throne, high and lofty; and the hem of his robe filled the temple. ²Seraphs were in attendance above him; each had six wings: with two they covered their faces, and with two they covered their feet, and with two they flew. ³And one called to another and said:

"Holy, holy, holy is the LORD of hosts;

the whole earth is full of his glory."

⁴The pivots on the thresholds shook at the voices of those who called, and the house filled with smoke.

⁵And I said: "Woe is me! I am lost, for I am a man of unclean lips, and I live among a people of unclean lips; yet my eyes have seen the King, the LORD of hosts!"

⁶Then one of the seraphs flew to me, holding a live coal that had been taken from the altar with a pair of tongs. ⁷The seraph touched my mouth with it and said: "Now that this has touched your lips, your guilt has departed and your sin is blotted out." ⁸Then I heard the voice of the Lord saying, "Whom shall I send, and who will go for us?" And I said, "Here am I; send me!"

⁹And he said, "Go and say to this people:

'Keep listening, but do not comprehend;

keep looking, but do not understand.'

¹⁰Make the mind of this people dull,

and stop their ears,

and shut their eyes,

so that they may not look with their eyes,

and listen with their ears,

and comprehend with their minds,

and turn and be healed."

¹¹Then I said, "How long, O Lord?" And he said:

"Until cities lie waste

without inhabitant,

and houses without people,

and the land is utterly desolate;

¹²until the LORD sends everyone far away,

and vast is the emptiness in the midst of the land.

¹³Even if a tenth part remain in it,

it will be burned again,

like a terebinth or an oak

whose stump remains standing

when it is felled."

The holy seed is its stump.

After the reading the reader may say: The Word of the Lord

C: Thanks be to God.

<u>Scripture Poetry</u> Isaiah 1:12-20 (read responsively)

D: When you come to appear before me, who asked this from your hand?

Trample my courts no more;

C: bringing offerings is futile; incense is an abomination to me.

D: New moon and sabbath and calling of convocation— I cannot endure solemn assemblies with iniquity.

C: Your new moons and your appointed festivals my soul hates;

they have become a burden to me, I am weary of bearing them.

D: When you stretch out your hands, I will hide my eyes from you;

C: even though you make many prayers, I will not listen; your hands are full of blood.

D: Wash yourselves; make yourselves clean; remove the evil of your doings from before my eyes;

C: cease to do evil,

17learn to do good;
seek justice,

rescue the oppressed, defend the orphan,

plead for the widow.

D: Come now, let us argue it out, says the LORD:

C: though your sins are like scarlet, they shall be like snow; though they are red like crimson, they shall become like wool.

D: If you are willing and obedient, you shall eat the good of the land;

C: but if you refuse and rebel, you shall be devoured by the sword; for the mouth of the LORD has spoken.

Gospel Reading Matthew 15:1-9

The gospel is announced:

P: The Holy Gospel according to St. Matthew the 15th chapter.

C: Glory to you O Lord.

Then Pharisees and scribes came to Jesus from Jerusalem and said, ²"Why do your disciples break the tradition of the elders? For they do not wash their hands before they eat." ³He answered them, "And why do you break the commandment of God for the sake of your tradition? ⁴For God said, 'Honor your father and your mother,' and, 'Whoever speaks evil of father or mother must surely die.' ⁵But you say that whoever tells father or mother, 'Whatever support you might have had from me is given to God,' then that person need not honor the father. ⁶So, for the sake of your tradition, you make void the word of God. ⁷You hypocrites! Isaiah prophesied rightly about you when he said:

8'This people honors me with their lips,

but their hearts are far from me;

⁹in vain do they worship me,

teaching human precepts as doctrines."


