

The Prophets — "2nd Isaiah" August 29, 2021 10:30 Service of the Word

Today we read from Isaiah 40, which is considered to be from "2nd Isaiah". 2nd Isaiah covers chapters 40-55. It was most likely written in the city of Babylon sometime between 545 and 539 B.C.E. Decades have passed since the destruction of Jerusalem. All has been lost, but in the loss the people have discovered new and deeper truths about God. The tone of chapter 40 is a marked contrast to what we've experienced from the prophets thus far. Other messages have been doom and gloom, and threats of destruction. But Isaiah 40 is a message of comfort, promises, and hope for the near future.

<u>First Reading</u> Isaiah 40:1-6
B: Comfort, O comfort my people, says your God.

²Speak tenderly to Jerusalem, and cry to her that she has served her term, that her penalty is paid,

that she has received from the Lord's hand double for all her sins.

³A voice cries out:

"In the wilderness prepare the way of the LORD, make straight in the desert a highway for our God.

⁴Every valley shall be lifted up, and every mountain and hill be made low;

the uneven ground shall become level, and the rough places a plain.

⁵Then the glory of the LORD shall be revealed, and all people shall see it together, for the mouth of the LORD has spoken."

¹⁴Whom did he consult for his enlightenment, and who taught him the path of justice?

Who taught him knowledge,

and showed him the way of understanding?

¹⁵Even the nations are like a drop from a bucket, and are accounted as dust on the scales; see, he takes up the isles like fine dust.

¹⁶Lebanon would not provide fuel enough, nor are its animals enough for a burnt offering.

¹⁷All the nations are as nothing before him; they are accounted by him as less than nothing and emptiness.

¹⁸To whom then will you liken God, or what likeness compare with him?


