

Prelude and Announcements

Lighting of the Advent Wreath

(*Read immediately after the congregation is seated from the Prayer of the Day*) A: Blessed are you, O Lord our God, ruler of the universe. Your prophets spoke of a day when the desert would blossom and water would break forth in the wilderness. Bless us as we light the candles on this wreath. Strengthen our hearts as we prepare for the coming of the Lord. May he give water to all who thirst, for he is our light and our salvation. Blessed be God forever.

C: Amen

As the third candle on the wreath is lit we sing: Oh Come, Oh Come, Emmanuel (For music turn to Hymn 257 in the Red Hymnal) 1. Oh come, Oh come Emmanuel, and ransom captive Israel, that mourns in lonely exile here until the Son of God appear.

Refrain: **Rejoice! Emmanuel Shall come to you, O Israel.**

- 3. O come, O come, O Lord of might, as to your tribes on Sinai's height in ancient times you gave the law in cloud and majesty and awe. *Refrain*
- 4. O come, O Branch of Jesse, free your own from Satan's tyranny; from depths of hell your people save, and give them vict'ry o'er the grave. *Refrain*

First Reading Jeremiah 31:15-20 B: Thus says the LORD: A voice is heard in Ramah. lamentation and bitter weeping. Rachel is weeping for her children; she refuses to be comforted for her children, because they are no more. ¹⁶Thus says the LORD: Keep your voice from weeping, and your eyes from tears; for there is a reward for your work, says the LORD: they shall come back from the land of the enemy; ¹⁷there is hope for your future, says the LORD: your children shall come back to their own country. ¹⁸Indeed I heard Ephraim pleading: "You disciplined me, and I took the discipline; I was like a calf untrained. Bring me back, let me come back, for you are the LORD my God. ¹⁹For after I had turned away I repented; and after I was discovered, I struck my thigh; I was ashamed, and I was dismayed because I bore the disgrace of my youth." ²⁰Is Ephraim my dear son? Is he the child I delight in? As often as I speak against him, I still remember him. Therefore I am deeply moved for him; I will surely have mercy on him, says the LORD. After the reading the reader may say: The Word of the Lord C: Thanks be to God. Scripture Poetry Psalm 40:1-12 (read responsively) D: I waited and waited for God. At long last God bent down to hear my complaint, C: and pulled me from the grave

C: and pulled me from the grave out of the swamp, and gave me a steady stride on rock-solid ground.

D: God taught me a new song, a hymn of praise. Seeing all this, many will be moved to trust in the Lord.

- C: Happy are they who trust in God, not seduced by idols nor won over by lies.
- D: You do so many wonders, you show you care for us,
- C: Lord my God; you are beyond compare. Were I to name them all, no one could keep track.
- D: You did not seek offerings or ask for sacrifices; but you drilled ears for me to hear.
- C: "Yes," I said, "I will come to live by your written word."
- D: I want to do what pleases you; your teaching is in my heart.
- C: I celebrate your justice before all the assembly; I do not hold back the story. Lord, you know this is true.
- D: I did not hide in my heart your acts of rescue;I boldly declared to all your truth and care, your faithful love.
- C: Your maternal love surrounds me, Lord. Your sure and tender care protects me always.

Gospel Acclamation (Matthew 2:6)

C: Alleluia. And you, Bethlehem, in the land of Judah, are by no means least among the rulers of Judah; for from you shall come a ruler who is to shepherd my people Israel. Alleluia. Gospel Reading Matthew 2:1-18

The gospel is announced:

P: The Holy Gospel according to St. Matthew 2nd chapter.

C: Glory to you O Lord.

In the time of King Herod, after Jesus was born in Bethlehem of Judea, wise men from the East came to Jerusalem, ²asking, "Where is the child who has been born king of the Jews? For we observed his star at its rising, and have come to pay him homage." ³When King Herod heard this, he was frightened, and all Jerusalem with him; ⁴and calling together all the chief priests and scribes of the people, he inquired of them where the Messiah was to be born. ⁵They told him, "In Bethlehem of Judea; for so it has been written by the prophet:

⁶'And you, Bethlehem, in the land of Judah,

are by no means least among the rulers of Judah; for from you shall come a ruler

who is to shepherd my people Israel."

⁷Then Herod secretly called for the wise men and learned from them the exact time when the star had appeared. ⁸Then he sent them to Bethlehem, saying, "Go and search diligently for the child; and when you have found him, bring me word so that I may also go and pay him homage." ⁹When they had heard the king, they set out; and there, ahead of them, went the star that they had seen at its rising, until it stopped over the place where the child was. ¹⁰When they saw that the star had stopped, they were overwhelmed with joy. ¹¹On entering the house, they saw the child with Mary his mother; and they knelt down and paid him homage. Then, opening their treasure chests, they offered him gifts of gold, frankincense, and myrrh. ¹²And having been warned in a dream not to return to Herod, they left for their own country by another road.

¹³Now after they had left, an angel of the Lord appeared to Joseph in a dream and said, "Get up, take the child and his mother, and flee to Egypt, and remain there until I tell you; for Herod is about to search for the child, to destroy him." ¹⁴Then Joseph got up, took the child and his mother by night, and went to Egypt, ¹⁵and remained there until the death of Herod. This was to fulfill what had been spoken by the Lord through the prophet, "Out of Egypt I have called my son."

¹⁶When Herod saw that he had been tricked by the wise men, he was infuriated, and he sent and killed all the children in and around Bethlehem who were two years old or under, according to the time that he had learned from the wise men. ¹⁷Then was fulfilled what had been spoken through the prophet Jeremiah:

¹⁸"A voice was heard in Ramah, wailing and loud lamentation, Rachel weeping for her children;

she refused to be consoled, because they are no more." ¹⁹When Herod died, an angel of the Lord suddenly appeared in a dream to Joseph in Egypt and said, ²⁰"Get up, take the child and his mother, and go to the land of Israel, for those who were seeking the child's life are dead." ²¹Then Joseph got up, took the child and his mother, and went to the land of Israel. ²²But when he heard that Archelaus was ruling over Judea in place of his father Herod, he was afraid to go there. And after being warned in a dream, he went away to the district of Galilee. ²³There he made his home in a town called Nazareth, so that what had been spoken through the prophets might be fulfilled, "He will be called a Nazorean."

<u>Sending Hymn</u> People, Look East (For music see Hymn 248 in the Red Hymnal)


