Pastor's Paragraphs

Happy Advent... maybe?

This is certainly the strangest of holiday seasons. It feels like we're getting ready for our culture's annual Christmas celebration but not the right way. This is a time of traditions, but adaptation is this year's norm. It begs the questions of what is essential and what is dependable?

This Advent we are going to look at three things that we can count on – three things that endure; are eternal actually. These three things are not objects. No object will last forever. These are the three things that show up over and over again in the Bible. St. Paul liked to put them together as a trio. They are the foundation of our lives and how we exist. They are faith, hope, and love.

There are four weeks in Advent. We will look at each in turn for the first three Sundays. We'll have the children's Christmas program on the fourth.

Faith, hope, and love can sound like soft and cuddly concepts, things that the nice and the immature live by. But this is a mistaken idea. Each is capable, powerful, and even ferocious. In 1 Corinthians 13 St. Paul goes so far as to say that love is the most powerful force in the universe. (If you're a fan of the Harry Potter books you may have noticed that author J.K. Rowling brings that up over and over again in the fight against evil.) Faith, hope, and love are not to be trivialized or taken lightly. These are forces God invites us to use to great effect. They will keep you strong and whole. By living by them you will never feel ashamed. There is also no mistake you can make, nor evil that you can do, that can overcome these forces. They are. They always have been. They always will be.

When everything seems wrong this Advent we turn to those things which will always be right: faith, hope, and love. I pray that you always find strength in them, and I "hope" I can preach in a way that does justice to their power.

Children's Sunday School

Snow Removal Volunteers




