

July 25, 2021

10:30 Service of the Word

Zechariah was a contemporary of Haggai, who we read from last week. Both of these prophets address the time after the Jews were allowed to return from Babylon and rebuild Jerusalem. While Haggai focuses on building the temple, Zechariah focuses on the human leadership. Zechariah's prophesy is highly symbolic. We'll read two portions of it in worship today – Chapters 3 and 9.

Introduction to the Reading

First Reading Zechariah 3

B: Then he showed me the high priest Joshua standing before the angel of the LORD, and Satan standing at his right hand to accuse him. ²And the LORD said to Satan, "The LORD rebuke you, O Satan! The LORD who has chosen Jerusalem rebuke you! Is not this man a brand plucked from the fire?" ³Now Joshua was dressed with filthy clothes as he stood before the angel. ⁴The angel said to those who were standing before him, "Take off his filthy clothes." And to him he said, "See, I have taken your guilt away from you, and I will clothe you with festal apparel." ⁵And I said, "Let them put a clean turban on his head." So they put a clean turban on his head and clothed him with the apparel; and the angel of the LORD was standing by. ⁶Then the angel of the LORD assured Joshua, saying ⁷"Thus says the LORD of hosts: If you will walk in my ways and keep my requirements, then you shall rule my house and have charge of my courts, and I will give you the right of access among those who are standing here.

⁸Now listen, Joshua, high priest, you and your colleagues who sit before you! For they are an omen of things to come: I am going to bring my servant the Branch. ⁹For on the stone that I have set before Joshua, on a single stone with seven facets, I will engrave its inscription, says the LORD of hosts, and I will remove the guilt of this land in a single day. ¹⁰On that day, says the LORD of hosts, you shall invite each other to come under your vine and fig tree.

After the reading the reader may say: The Word of the Lord

C: Thanks be to God.

Scripture Poetry Zechariah 9:9-13 (read responsively)

D: Rejoice greatly, O daughter Zion! Shout aloud, O daughter Jerusalem!

C: Lo, your king comes to you; triumphant and victorious is he, humble and riding on a donkey, on a colt, the foal of a donkey.

D: He will cut off the chariot from Ephraim and the warhorse from Jerusalem; and the battle-bow shall be cut off.

and he shall command peace to the nations;

C: his dominion shall be from sea to sea, and from the River to the ends of the earth.

D: As for you also, because of the blood of my covenant with you, I will set your prisoners free from the waterless pit.

C: Return to your stronghold, O prisoners of hope; today I declare that I will restore to you double.

D: For I have bent Judah as my bow; I have made Ephraim its arrow.

C: I will arouse your sons, O Zion, against your sons, O Greece, and wield you like a warrior's sword.

Second Reading 1 Corinthians 1:26-31

E: [Paul writes:] Consider your own call, brothers and sisters: not many of you were wise by human standards, not many were powerful, not many were of noble birth. ²⁷But God chose what is foolish in the world to shame the wise; God chose what is weak in the world to shame the strong; ²⁸God chose what is low and despised in the world, things that are not, to reduce to nothing things that are, ²⁹so that no one might boast in the presence of God. ³⁰He is the source of your life in Christ Jesus, who became for us wisdom from God, and righteousness and sanctification and redemption, ³¹in order that, as it is written, "Let the one who boasts, boast in the Lord."

After the reading the reader may say: The Word of the Lord

C: Thanks be to God.

Gospel Acclamation (1 Corinthians 1:27)

C: Alleluia. God chose what is foolish in the world to shame the wise; God chose what is weak in the world to shame the strong. Alleluia.

Gospel Reading John 7:25-31

The gospel is announced:

P: The Holy Gospel according to St. John the 7th chapter.

C: Glory to you O Lord.

²⁵Now some of the people of Jerusalem were saying, "Is not this the man whom they are trying to kill? ²⁶And here he is, speaking openly, but they say nothing to him! Can it be that the authorities really know that this is the Messiah? ²⁷Yet we know where this man is from; but when the Messiah comes, no one will know where he is from." ²⁸Then Jesus cried

out as he was teaching in the temple, "You know me, and you know where I am from. I have not come on my own. But the one who sent me is true, and you do not know him. ²⁹I know him, because I am from him, and he sent me." ³⁰Then they tried to arrest him, but no one laid hands on him, because his hour had not yet come. ³¹Yet many in the crowd believed in him and were saying, "When the Messiah comes, will he do more signs than this man has done?"

Sermon

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Response to the Word

E: In Christ you have heard the word of truth, the gospel of your salvation.

C: We believe in him and are marked with the seal of the promised Holy Spirit.

E: Living together in trust and hope, we confess our faith.

C: I believe in God, the Father almighty, creator of heaven and earth.

I believe in Jesus Christ, God's only Son, our Lord, who was conceived by the Holy Spirit, born of the virgin Mary, suffered under Pontius Pilate, was crucified, died, and was buried; he descended to the dead.

On the third day he rose again; he ascended into heaven, he is seated at the right hand of the Father, and he will come to judge the living and the dead.

I believe in the Holy Spirit, the holy catholic church, the communion of saints the forgiveness of sins, the resurrection of the body, and the life everlasting. Amen.

E: We remember before you today your servant and apostle James, the first among the disciples to be martyred. Pour out on the members of your church that spirit of self-denying service which is the true mark of your love. Lord in your mercy...

C: Hear our prayer.

The pastor concludes the prayer:

P: Into your hands, gracious God, we commend all for whom we pray, trusting in your mercy; through Jesus Christ our Savior.

C: Amen.
