Pastor's Paragraphs

The recent decisions coming from the Supreme Court appear to be calling into question principles of constitutional interpretation that have been in place for ages. Laws that have been accepted for over a century are now being called into question, and sometimes deemed unconstitutional. While many see politicization at the root of it all, the central issue is how to interpret a document, the root of which comes to us from centuries ago. I am by no means a constitutional scholar, but I believe the nation's founders created the constitution to be a living document. The amendment process allows changes to be made as necessary. However, the last time our constitution was amended was with the 26th Amendment, which went into effect in July 1971. The world has changed a lot in 51 years! At a personal level I am deeply concerned about the power dynamics currently driving our nation. But my personal feelings are just that.

How to interpret the Constitution opens the door for questioning how to interpret Christian scripture. Unlike the Constitution, which is changeable, our scriptures are not. Since the Bible does not change how do we interpret it? What should our guiding principles be? If the world has changed a lot since our Constitution was last amended, how much more has the world changed since the latest parts of the Bible were written?!? The youngest parts of our Bible come to us from late in the first century. The oldest parts are more than 1100 years older than that!

Biblical interpretation is very imprecise at best. That is actually at the heart of our faith. Much of Jesus' ministry was about undoing the precision many religious leaders of his day sought to have. He challenged them to see the spirit of the law and not the letter of the law. He challenged them to live by the principles of God's love and grace; not by legalism.

The Bible is an enormous book. It is highly complex. And it contradicts itself countless times. Even within the New Testament we find countless contradictions. In fact, even within St. Paul's own writings we find contradictions! When you combine those contradictions with the sheer age of it all you may be tempted to just

chuck the whole thing out. In fact many do! Or they see it as a leftover from the ignorant past. Such approaches are mistakes.

On of my seminary professors, Dr. Richard Nelson, described the Bible as, "humanity's attempt to grasp the ungraspable." Indeed, try as we might, we simply cannot put the truth of God's existence into words. Not only that, we cannot put the truth of God into the limits of human reason. When we talk about God, or think about God, or read about God, we truly are trying to grasp the ungraspable!

And yet Christians have always held the Bible to be God's inspired word for our faith. It does contain the truth that God intends for us to have. How are we to interpret it?

Perhaps "interpret" is the wrong concept to use. Perhaps I should say, how do we "live" the truth about God that it teaches? How are we then to shape our lives from what we discover? The Bible does not give us clear cut straightforward answers, though many insist that it does. No, the Bible takes us into the faith struggles of our ancestors. In so doing it connects us on a dynamic journey. It invites us to walk with our own life issues along side the lives who have gone before us. There we discover God's grace and God's will. The ultimate truths we discover are what St. Paul tells the Corinthians (1 Corinthians 13): Faith, Hope, and Love. We build from there. That gives rise to incredible and beautiful diversity; which is what I think God's had in mind all along.

As for the Constitution, it needs to be able to be interpreted with precision. As for the Bible, it's power comes through its in-built imprecision. Regardless of how the courts interpret our laws, we as Christians live the Bible's calling to be people of faith, hope, and love. Blessings,


