Pastor's Paragraphs

Have you ever been in a quandary and decided to open the Bible to a random place, put down your finger, and see what it says? You've probably gotten some absurd answers! There are many jokes about people who do just that. Our church constitution says that the Bible is God's inspired word and that it is the congregation's "authoritative source and norm of its proclamation, faith, and life." (Section C2.03) Those are heady words. It is easy to think of the Bible as an intellectual treatise outlining Christian beliefs and morals. Indeed, the Bible does include that. But as we have been looking at poetry in the Old Testament for a summer worship series, we realize there is a lot more.

Poetry is not my thing. I'd rather study Paul's theology in his letters or the complex stories about Jesus in the gospels. Studying those things can give definite answers. Poetry does not. And ancient poetry can be particularly hard to understand. Nevertheless, if we neglect it totally it is to our detriment. So it is to the Bible's poetry that we are turning this summer.

In June we've looked at the book of Job. There we see the ancient Hebrew authors wrestling with the idea of suffering and pain. They struggle to come up with answers as to why a loving God would cause (or allow) such things. These are real issues and it is impossible to create absolute answers. In July and August we'll turn to other poetry books: Psalms, Proverbs, Ecclesiastes, and Song of Solomon.

We're familiar with the Psalms. We often read them as poems in worship. They express all sorts of feelings: happiness, love, joy, sorrow, frustration, shame, and hate. We rarely use the shame and hate psalms, but they are there. If it is a human emotion, the Psalms will explore it.

Proverbs are about wisdom. And interestingly enough, we meet "Woman Wisdom," which the ancient Hebrews considered a feminine quality in God's creative and organizing work. In my opinion, this is a largely overlooked idea that needs more attention in these days when many people are trying to erase gender understandings of God.

Ecclesiastes is downright depressing. We won't spend much time with it. But is does question mortality and the purpose of life.

And of course there is the Song of Solomon, a love poem that gets a little too sexually graphic for reading in Sunday worship. I'll be picking the verses carefully when we do that book!

I mention all this because we sell our scripture short when we see it as only about history and theology and morality. God has blessed us in the way the Bible explores every aspect of what it means to be human – all the way to your joys, your fears, and your sexuality. Though not everything is clear in the Bible, every subject is within bounds!

God is not stingy with us. God does not call on us to do hard things and then leave us with overly simple instructions. God gives us what we need for everything that comes our way.

If you've never read the Bible, or if you've tried and fizzled out in Leviticus, consider reading a couple chapters of the poetry books every day. They can be confusing, but if you dwell in them you will find yourself feeling the same things that people did thousands of years ago, and you will be finding God in those feelings just as they did.
