#### **Pastor's Paragraphs**

The First Council of Nicea began in May 325 and ran through July of that year. Now in 2025 we are celebrating its 1700<sup>th</sup> anniversary. The council was the first legal gathering of Christian leaders from throughout the world. It was called by Roman Emperor Constantine to deal with some serious issues of heresy. While it could be said that Constantine called the council for political reasons, it was still the first time Christians could really come to common agreement on some of the biggest questions of faith. Debates and arguments were often heated. There is even a story that Nicholas, Bishop of Myra (a.k.a. Santa Claus) punched the heretic Arius in the face. The story isn't true but it does accurately challenge the "Jolly Old St. Nicholas" image that our culture has invented.

It was long believed that the Nicene Creed was written at the council. Strictly speaking, that is not true. However, the issues the Nicene Creed deals with were definitely addressed there. The Nicene Creed didn't come to its current form until the First Council of Constantinople in the year 481.

We don't use the Nicene Creed in worship all that often - usually only for Communion services in the seasons of Advent, Christmas, Lent, and Easter. Perhaps you groan when you open the bulletin and see the long creed. It is full of complex concepts and obscure words. It is probably hard to make sense of as we read it. We may find ourselves thinking things like, "Who cares?" and, "What's the big deal?" Yet it is a big deal. All of it is! For example, it is actually a VERY big deal that we understand that Jesus was, "begotten, not made." Get that belief wrong and you can quickly end up with a very warped Christianity. I won't go into the issues here, but I will note that each and every word of the creed (originally written in Greek) has been painstakingly chosen, and each word bears weight. The Nicene Creed is the oldest creed. (The Apostles Creed is actually newer.) And it is the only Christian doctrine accepted as authoritative by Christians throughout the world. No word can ever be added, subtracted, or changed. Complex as it is, and even as we may not understand it, the Nicene Creed is what we depend upon for biblical interpretation and for Christian beliefs overall.

June 15 is Holy Trinity Sunday. It is a fitting Sunday to remember the Council of Nicea and appreciate the

issues it wrestled with. 1700 years later we benefit greatly from their efforts.

Don't groan when you see the Nicene Creed show up in a worship service. Even as its words are obscure and its issues may seem archaic, remember that it is what makes our faith work and we depend upon it every day. Blessings, Pastor Jon

1. What do James and John offer to do to the Samaritan village that didn't welcome them?


2. In the parable of the Good Samaritan where was the man who was attacked heading?
