Pastor's Paragraphs

Lent is a somber season. It draws our attention to the brokenness we feel in our relationship with God. We connect brokenness from God with sin. We say that we cannot escape from sinning and so we must depend upon God's grace to save us.

That quick summary of our situation is all well and good, but it passes over a subtle but significant point about sin. St. Augustine's writings from the 4th century have become foundational to many people's understanding of sin. Augustine's thoughts tend to link sin to guilt. There's some basis for that, especially 1st John 3:4 (Everyone who commits sin is guilty of lawlessness; sin is lawlessness.) However that actually misses the Bible's main thrust about sin; which is connecting sin to shame.

Shame and guilt are similar words but they have significantly different meanings. Guilt is feeling bad about *something you have done* that is wrong. Shame is feeling that *who you are* is wrong. Shame is about something inherent to your worthiness as a person.

When we root our understanding of sin in guilt then we tend to think sin is an action (or perhaps an inaction) that was wrong. Forgiveness is wiping it away as if it never happened. However, when we root our understanding of sin in shame we are in a very different place. Shame tells us that *who were are* before God is hopelessly lost and unlovable. It tells us that no matter what we do we cannot become good enough to deserve God's love. Forgiveness then is not about ignoring a bad thing we did. Forgiveness is God seeing us as people worthy of loving.

The word "guilt" never shows up in the New Testament. The word "guilty" shows up four times, and two of those times refer to Jesus' trial. By contrast the word "shame" shows up eighteen times. "Ashamed" shows up sixteen times. That's a total of thirty-four times! Our scripture is far more concerned with shame than guilt.

I believe rooting sin in shame is far more appropriate than rooting it in guilt. If sin is rooted in guilt, then an upright, upstanding citizen may actually believe that he or she can live a good enough life to make it to heaven. Not so! When sin is rooted in shame we understand reality. We cannot earn our way into God's love. Period.

Crucifixion was a very shameful way to die. We see that in Hebrews 12:2, "...looking to Jesus the pioneer and perfecter of our faith, who for the sake of the joy that was set before him endured the cross, disregarding its shame, and has taken his seat at the right hand of the throne of God." The earliest Christians never depicted the cross in their art. It was simply too shameful. And yet the shame of the crucifixion was central to being a follower of Christ. Ultimately the work God does for our salvation is more about shame than it is about guilt.

I don't want to go so far as to say we need to feel ashamed of ourselves. Shame can be absolutely crippling. Some people suffer terribly. However a healthy dose of realizing that we cannot be truly good in and of ourselves is important. Some sense of shame is necessary to truly feel forgiveness. Grace – true grace – grace that is abundant, and amazing, and awe-inspiring – comes when a person realizes God's never failing love for them is truly undeserved. God's grace says you are worthwhile and important no matter how bad you feel you are.

Ultimately God loves you. God wants to be in relationship with you. God made you good. God wants to help you to flourish. What really matters then is that it is God who graciously reaches out to us each and every day. God wants to be with us. Blessings, Pastor Jon
