## Growth <br> Pastor's Paragraphs

I recently tried to listen to a podcast while on an early morning walk in Canandaigua. I had left my headphones at church so I decided to just turn on the phone's speaker and hold it close to my ear. Listening was hard unless I wanted to turn the volume way up (which would have quickly depleted the battery). I never realized how much noise there was early in the morning, even in the sleepy little city of Canandaigua.
How much noise is there in your life? I suspect our ears are constantly bombarded by the hustle and bustle of life. Normally we aren't consciously aware of it, but it is still there, still influencing us.

Jesus regularly took time to go away by himself into a desolate place and pray. We find that especially true in Luke's gospel. I believe Luke has some dozen or more scenes where Jesus is praying. They can be all summed up in Luke 5:16 though, "But he would withdraw to deserted places and pray."

Life is returning to its normal hustle and bustle as the pandemic appears to be winding down. That means life's normal noise is coming back to its full force too. With the season of Lent right around the corner I encourage you to add some quiet prayer time into your day if you don't do so already.

Prayers don't have to be big formal things. They don't even need to take a lot of time. Even if you're at work it can be good to take a fifteen second prayer break from time to time. And if you don't know what to pray, there is always Luther's Small Catechism. You may remember he has very brief prayers to say at the beginning and at the end of the day, and at mealtimes. Judaism and Islam both have practices of prayer multiple times a day. Christianity does too, although it slipped out of prominence in the Protestant Reformation. But it's worth returning to it. Our world is so loud it's no wonder we can't hear God's voice. This Lent either add to your prayer time or make it a priority. We all need time for quiet reflection with our God.

## Thrice Daily Call to Prayer

The biggest bell in our tower strikes the hour of the day from 7 am until 9 pm . That is a very practical use of the bell. It is also a very linear (and structured) way to tell time. But that's not all that church bells used to do. They also used to call people into a regular time for spiritual contemplation.
Beginning on Ash Wednesday the smallest bell in the tower will begin ringing The Angelus. That's a three-times-a-day call to prayer. The practice began sometime in the Middle Ages. The little bell will ring at: 6am, noon, and 6 pm . It will have three strikes, then pause, three more strikes, then pause, then three final strikes. It is a call to prayer and thanksgiving to God.

Though almost all of us live beyond the hearing of the bell you are encouraged to take time regularly in your day to pause a few seconds and reconnect with God.

The Angelus is easy enough to set up for us. The computer that controls the bells came preprogrammed to do it. We've just never turned it on!

## Adult Sunday School

The adult Sunday school resumes with a look at the gospel of Luke from 1517 Academy. It's a combination video course and discussion. Stop in the middle classroom in the Sunday school wing during the Sunday school hour.

## 8:30 Breakfast Church during Lent

Our 8:30 worship service will explore a "breakfast church" model during the season of Lent. Tables will be set up in the back of the sanctuary. Worship will begin with a hymn and a prayer. Then worshippers will serve themselves whatever delicious breakfast foods have been prepared for that morning. As they eat the scriptures will be read. There won't be so much of a sermon as an interactive reflection on the gospel reading. The service will wrap up with prayers and song. When there is communion it will be incorporated right into the meal.


Prayers at 10:30 Worship During Lent
We'll be changing the way we do the "Prayer of the Church" at the 10:30 service during Lent. Instead of having a few petitions read by members of the congregation we'll invite everyone to write a petition or
two on a slip of paper. We'll set our portable fire pit just outside the side door of the sanctuary. During the prayer time you'll be invited to take your prayer to the fire and throw it in. This is rooted in Psalm 141 which reads, "Let my prayer rise up like incense before you."
