Pastor's Paragraphs

It seems like a lot of the world is descending into chaos. We face serious ongoing racial tensions in our nation. We continue to deal with the coronavirus pandemic. Politics seem to always be in a state of turmoil. There are major international tensions with Iran, China, Russia, and others.

I could make a list of chaos and uncertain things that goes on and on. Sometimes I wonder if things are indeed worse than before. Or perhaps things are always that way and I just don't realize. Whatever is the truth it can feel overwhelming when so much seems uncertain.

I have been reading C.S. Lewis' book *Mere Christianity*. He has a section about God and time that I think can help us in all of this. He describes how we understand time as if it were a line. We see ourselves traveling on that line from event A to event B to event C. We live in the present. Let's call that point B. We can see clearly in the past. Let's call that point A. We can somewhat safely predict a little bit into the future, but if time C is too far we can't really predict it with any certainty. We tend to see the universe, and God along with it, moving from past to future just as we do.

However a line is only a one dimensional object. Lewis says, "If you picture Time as a line along which we have to travel, then you must picture God as the whole page on which the line is drawn." (Pg. 147, Macmillan 1960 edition) God, then from above, or outside, or all around, can see the whole line all at once. This can be hard for us to wrap our heads around, but it does get us to the idea that God is bigger than time. (Time is one of God's creations after all!) From this perspective we can see how God safely holds all of time all at once.

What does that mean when things in the world are descending into chaos? It means that God knows and holds the future securely. God is able to see (and be in) the past, present, and future simultaneously. We are truly safe and secure in God's care. Nothing that happens in the world can change that.

I invite you to live with confidence and boldness in the face of the world's many challenges. Act from faith and you are sure to be a constructive part of what God is seeking to accomplish. To be sure you will do some things well. And with equal certainty you will make some blunders. But all of them will be done within God's sight. Ultimately rejoice that God has chosen you and equipped you for living in this moment in time, and that God will provide you with what this moment requires.

- 4. Who said, "Truly this man was God's Son"? Answer: The Roman centurion overseeing the crucifixion (Mark 15:39)


May Bible Trivia Questions
