Pastor's Paragraphs

I recently had a conversation with a music teacher at the Canandaigua Primary School. I asked her if she ever got frustrated working with only musical beginners when she herself has so much talent, and spent so many hours developing her musical skills. She said that she actually prefers working with little kids because they hold nothing back when they make music. They don't know they're playing the wrong notes, or that their voice sounds terrible, or that they're out of rhythm. They just make sounds with full hearted abandon. She said that as children age they become more self-conscious. Their music begins to reflect that too.

While kindergarteners making music will always set my teeth on edge, I do understand her point. At what point do we start to sacrifice our truest, most authentic, raw selves in order to fit in? Childhood development experts would say it is all part of the maturing process. I won't argue with them. But I will say that adults have lost a fundamental part of themselves. Adults have forgotten how to have fun in a truly abandoned way. It is a very sad thing when adults have to resort to drinking too much or using drugs just to have any fun at all. What happened to the child they used to be for whom fun came naturally?

Perhaps even more sad is the way church and faith have become the most serious things of all. My mind goes to this prayer called "I Am in Need of... What? by Ted Loder:

"Are you really as humorless,

as grimly serious,

as I have made you out to be?

Or do aardvarks and monkeys,

bullfrogs and platypuses,

puppies and porpoises,

and people, perhaps,

reveal the comic side of your grace, the playful side of your love?"

He goes on:

"Tickle me into giggling down the wailing walls

of my endless grievances. and trip up my waddling pomposities."

(Guerillas of Grace, 1981 Augsburg Fortress)

As we are in the Easter season let's not overlook the playfulness, silliness even, of the Bible's stories of the resurrection. All the gospels describe the events of Good Friday in a deeply somber way. And all of the gospels depict the resurrection with tricks, surprises, and unpredictability. Why shouldn't God have fun? And why shouldn't God enjoy delighting people with surprises?

Don't forget to have fun in faith. Be a kindergartener making music. God knows you better than you know yourself. God knows where your true self ends and your manufactured "socially acceptable" self begins. This Easter spend some silly time dwelling in the authentic self God made you to be.

Ted Loder continues in that prayer, "Lord of laughter, as of tears, shake me awake and teach me to laugh at myself

all the way down

to the inescapable bottom, to the awareness that I must get on with being who I am as fully as I can, as unflinchingly as I can, as accurately as I can, which is to say, as gracefully, as powerfully, as faithfully as you created me to be. Blessings, Pastor Jon

Upcoming Bible Readings for Worship




