#### Pastor's Paragraphs

In my role as the dean of the Genesee Finger Lakes Conference I was recently asked to provide an "implicit bias awareness" training for the conference. These trainings are controversial. Your employer, or an organization you belong to, may have required you to take training like this; and perhaps other trainings about race and gender. I have certainly been required to attend plenty. They're usually pretty miserable. I find them to be filled with factual inaccuracies, questionable research, and broad generalizations. I find them to be counterproductive.

I thought that if I am to lead a training (And a controversial one at that!) I'm going to try to make it as productive and helpful as possible. I decided to seek out high quality research about implicit biases and apply it with good reasoning. That turned out to be a lot harder than I thought! Fortunately I did find some resources that were decent. But there weren't many. That took me down a side path. If issues of: race, gender, social class, age, etc. are of such importance to our society that we have to do all these trainings, then why am I finding so little solid information?

My searching took me to findings of the National Institute of Health (NIH). While findings from the NIH are also subject to biases and political pressures, they are at least critically vetted by a variety of scholars with different points of view. From what I found, I'm coming to the conclusion that those people who are the most driven by gender and race issues (whatever side they are on) often share the same measurable personality traits. Those traits are: low levels of agreeableness, high levels of judgmentalism, low levels of creativity, and high levels of close-mindedness. Here are links to a few of the studies:

If my conclusion is correct, then these are the last people who should be leading trainings and doing research! It's no wonder things are such a mess. It is as if these issues have become platforms for those who have the most disagreeable of personality traits to express themselves.

If our goal is to have a society where everyone has fair opportunities, a sense of personal agency (and responsibility), plus a willingness to work hard for the benefit of all, then we need to take a very different approach. There are no easy answers. These thingsa re complicated. But overall I think we would solve the problems if we took the approach that we find in 2 Peter 1:5-8:

"For this very reason you much make every effort to support your faith with goodness, and goodness with knowledge, and knowledge with self-control, and self-control with endurance, and endurance with godliness, and godliness with mutual affection, and mutual affection with love. For if these things are yours and increasing among you, they keep you from being ineffective and unfruitful in the knowledge of our Lord Jesus Christ."

- -Thank you to everyone who helped with planting the new apple trees.





- 4. After Jesus' first attempt to cure the blind man from Bethsaida, the man says he sees people but they look like what?


#### **May Bible Trivia Questions**
