Pastor's Paragraphs

One of our Bible readings for Reformation Sunday this year is 1 Corinthians 12. Early in that chapter (vs. 3) Paul writes, "...no one can say, 'Jesus is Lord' except by the Holy Spirit."

Although it is the oldest Christian confession, "Jesus is Lord" may ring hollow to our ears. It is a throw away statement; maybe even meaningless to us. However, with a highly divisive election going on it is not only meaningful but central to understand ourselves as citizens of this nation.

To the Corinthians a lord was someone who both demanded allegiance and offered protection. Saying Jesus is Lord was then a whole life pledge to follow Christ. In the *New Interpreter's Bible Commentary* theologian J. Paul Sampley writes,

"All of life was dedicated to honoring Christ. Every day. Every decision. Every nook and cranny of one's being and doing. Jesus' lordship is over all of life, or it is properly over none of it. Today we tend to divide up life into sacred and secular, with the sacred being rather restricted to Sundays and perhaps to a few times of daily devotion. In a like manner, we may think to restrict Christ's lordship to those sacred times of our lives and figure that in the rest of our time we can operate on a different basis, perhaps the way the rest of the world does. To say that 'Jesus is Lord' has meant, from the earliest days, to refuse to have life divided into secular and sacred with two value systems operative in the two areas." (Volume 10, Pg. 942)

While I certainly have my political opinions they are largely irrelevant. Neither Donald Trump nor Joe Biden will ever be my lord. Neither the Republican Party platform nor the Democratic Party platform dictate my life or my thoughts. My loyalty is to Jesus who is my lord. He has already accomplished the work of salvation. He has witnessed to God's love of the world. And he is promised to ultimately finish up God's purposes for everything. No politician can ever make good on a claim like that.

As we vote, as we live in a pandemic, as we earn and spend money, as we worship, as we eat, sleep, and breathe Jesus is Lord. Regardless of your political

views, to say that Jesus is Lord is to affirm that your loyalty is to Christ. It is to acknowledge that the world is a broken place. Evil and wrongdoing happen and they are unacceptable. It is also to acknowledge that God is working to reclaim all the world for himself. We live and work and have our being in that safety. That is our hope. That is our freedom.

November Bible Readings for Worship

In October and November we are looking at 1st and 2nd Corinthians. From these writings from St. Paul we get a glimpse into some of the issues the earliest Christians faced. Paul words carry several messages: advice, criticism, praise, and encouragement. We'll see where we are similar and where we are different from those people.

The final Sunday of November is the beginning of Advent. For Advent we will look at prophesies in Isaiah about Jesus' birth.

Pie Sunday


