# Pastor's Paragraphs

Climate change is in many people's minds these days. It appears to be a dynamic that is influencing the globe more than anything else in human history. While it is certainly a major problem, I consider it to be a symptom of an even bigger problem. Ultimately we have to address that bigger problem.

The bigger problem is human overpopulation. The world simple cannot support the current human population. To make matters worse, our numbers are even growing at an increasing rate. ...and perhaps there is an even bigger problem underneath that one!

I know what it is to have little, and I know what it is to have plenty. In any and all circumstances I have learned the secret of being well-fed and of going hungry, of having plenty and of being in need. I can do all thing through him who strengthens me." # Food Cupboard Thanksgiving Baskets



Lots of news coming from the Food Cupboard this month! In September we fed: 633 adults, 353 children, and 172 seniors.

Our Thanksgiving distribution will be November 18<sup>th</sup> and our Christmas distribution will be December 18<sup>th</sup>. Anyone who would like this assistance should call the Food Cupboard by Halloween at 585-924-2720. For the Christmas distribution, we would like to give pouches of cookie mixes, any flavor or brand. We'll need at least 300, so if folks could pick those up when they are on sale the next 6 weeks that would be wonderful!
