Pastor's Paragraphs

In October and November we are reading though the "Pastoral Epistles" (1 Timothy, 2 Timothy, Titus) during worship. These are controversial books of the Bible. Some of the teaching seem odd. Some of the teachings have caused great harm to many people over the centuries. They have been used to justify slavery, make women second class beings, and support racism.

Reading through them in worship is a daring thing to do, but I think it is good for us to do it. The Bible is not a simple answer book to all of life's questions. It is the Spirit-inspired struggles of our faith ancestors as they have tried to grasp God; which is basically trying to grasp the ungraspable.

The Bible must always be kept in context. I don't just mean keeping a verse or phrase in its larger context. I mean understand the cultural context into which it is written. I do not believe any of the biblical authors intended their writings to cause harm or to make people feel any less than the good and whole creations God has made people to be.

Keeping the Bible in its context does not mean we can just chuck parts of it out because we think it is a product of the past. Every generation believes it has somehow gotten a better grasp of the truth than previous generations. It believes it can right the wrongs of past ignorance. Indeed, there are many things in the past that were wrong and need to be corrected. But every generation needs to remember that it has its own innumerable blind spots as well.

Keeping the Bible in its context means that you understand and deeply value how God comes to us. Something that makes Christianity unique among the world's religious belief systems is the incarnation – the belief that the real historical person Jesus of Nazareth was fully God and fully human. While other religions have ideas that a god, or divine beings, could come to take human form, none have the idea of God taking human form for a lifetime; and then dying as the ultimate statement of power. Remember, Jesus often told his followers not to believe in him because of his miraculous powers. He tried to minimize them. But he

did tell his followers to take up their crosses and follow him. That's not something they could understand until it happened, but only afterward.

The point is this. God did not give us a list of rules or laws to follow – universal and absolute rules that apply for all times and places. (The life of Jesus wouldn't have been necessary if God wanted to do that!) God came to us deeply rooted in the context of the Roman empire in what we have named the "first century". When we can understand the dynamics of that world, and how Jesus related to that, we learn the abiding principles that can be applied for all other times and places.

Christianity does not give a neat and tidy belief system for those who want their faith to be simplistic. It will however give us solid beliefs to navigate the complex messiness of life. What might be the right solution for today may not be the right solution for tomorrow. For example, any parent knows that giving a four-year-old a "time out" in a chair might be good discipline. That's probably not going to work with a 17 year old!

We will read through 2 Timothy and Titus in November. We're going to encounter more teachings that are strange. And some will be offensive. I hope we can all learn from these struggles of the early Christians and use their struggles to grow for our own lives. They, like us, are part of the ongoing work of God's Church. And they, like us, are in the grasp of God's Spirit being drawn forward into the fullness of time. The journey will not be easy. Nor will it be fair. But it will be a journey worth taking.
