Pastor's Paragraphs

You've probably seen a movie where a king sends a letter, and to send the letter he rolls up the paper, puts a big drop of candle wax over the seam, and then presses a ring or seal into the soft wax. That ring or seal created a pattern in the wax. The letter was thus "sealed". The seal guaranteed a few things. Assuming the recipient of the letter was familiar with the royal seal, the recipient knew who it came from. Plus, when receiving the letter the recipient would check to be sure the wax had not been cracked, and thus the seal broken. That would insure that no one, especially not a nosy courier or enemy, had read the contents of the letter.

We're reading through Ephesians during worship in September and October. We can't cover everything in the letter. It is too complex and too detailed to do that. One thing we passed over in September was 1:13. There it said we, "...were marked with the seal of the promised Holy Spirit." That is both a literal and figurative statement. When we baptize someone we take oil and make the sign of the cross on the person's forehead. We say, "Child of God, you have been sealed by the Holy Spirit and marked with the cross of Christ forever."

While the oil will be washed away and no visible mark is left on the person's skin, the seal is still there. It is God's mark of authenticity. It is God marking this person as a bearer of the gospel; just like a sealed letter from centuries ago would convey a message. Being sealed by the Holy Spirit is both an honor and a responsibility.

As we head towards election day on November 5, it is sure that the already divisive rhetoric of politicians will increase. Tensions will run higher. Tempers will be shorter across the nation. It would be great if on November 6 we'd all be able to breathe a sigh of relief and it will all be over. But that is unlikely to be the case. The tensions and divisive rhetoric will almost certainly continue. There will be no return to a calm and relaxed state of things.

The good news is that today, and tomorrow, and election day, and on the day after that, we are marked with the seal of the promised Holy Spirit. That is our past, present, and future. It is secure. Though it may not always (or even often) feel like it, the Holy Spirit is with us in this troubled and problem-filled world. We shouldn't expect life to be simple or easy. It never will

be. But we do have God's guarantee of guidance and security, no matter what happens. May you always feel peace and energy from the Holy Spirit in your life. Blessings, Pastor Jon

Church Garden Harvest

We harvested 1330 pound of potatoes from the chrch garden this year. That's on the low side for us. We had 3300 lbs. last year. Deer damage and weed problems hurt us. The pumpkins were similarly weak with year. Powdery Mildew and deer damage took their toll. Still, the potatoes were well receive by the food cupboard. The pumpkins we did get are being sold and the money donated to the food cupboard. It should be a couple hundred dollars.



On September 15 we picked the apples on the church property. It's too soon to expect anything from the trees we planted this year, but the thirteen established trees gave a decent harvest.



Like the potatoes, the apples were sent to the food cupboard. We saved both some apples, potatoes, and pumpkins for the Parish Thanksgiving Dinner in November.

Worship In-person and Zoom







Victor-Farmington Food Cupboard September 2024

Last year, the Victor-Farmington Food Cupboard was proud to provide over 600 Thanksgiving Baskets through the support of the local Victor, Farmington, and Canandaigua Community. We did this through the generosity you have shown with past donations, as we did not engage in a Thanksgiving Fundraising Event last year. We used the money we had in reserves to cover the 2023 cost of the program. Sadly, this year we are concerned that the dramatic increase in food prices has affected the most vulnerable of our neighbors, the hardest. For those in need, the challenges of providing for their family have been especially difficult. Each month the Food Cupboard serves over 650 families. The need is greater than ever, and we are asking for your support for this year's program.

Given the purchasing power that we enjoy through Foodlink and other mass distribution channels, please consider a monetary donation, all of which will go towards purchasing holiday food. For \$50, we will be able to provide a Thanksgiving Basket that will include as many of the items we all enjoy at our own holiday tables.
