In today's gospel reading Jesus says that he is the vine and we are the branches. The branches produce much fruit. It sounds like a wonderful idea; at least at first. Then Jesus goes on to talk about the vines being pruned to bear even more fruit. We live in wine country. We know that pruning is severe. A pruned vineyard looks terrible. Yet it is exactly where it needs to be to be productive in the next season. May we be willing to allow our lives to be pruned of unproductive vines and leaves so that we may bear much fruit.

P: The grace of our Lord Jesus Christ, the love of God, and the communion of the Holy Spirit be with you all.

A: You are the treasured people of the Lord,

C: a people holy to the Lord our God.

A: Keep the words of the Lord in your heart; teach them to your children.

C: Talk about them when you are at home and when you are away, when you lie down and when you rise.

A: One does not live by bread alone,

C: but by every word that comes from the mouth of the Lord.

Prayer of the Day

A: Let us pray...

O God, you give us your Son as the vine apart from whom we cannot life. Nourish our life in his resurrection, that we may bear the fruit of love and now the fullness of your joy, through Jesus Christ, our Savior and Lord, who lives and reigns with you and the Holy Spiri, one God, now and forever.

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First Reading Isaiah 5:1-7

B: Let me sing for my beloved my love-song concerning his vineyard:

My beloved had a vineyard on a very fertile hill.

²He dug it and cleared it of stones, and planted it with choice vines;

he built a watchtower in the midst of it, and hewed out a wine vat in it;

he expected it to yield grapes, but it yielded wild grapes.

³And now, inhabitants of Jerusalem and people of Judah,

judge between me

and my vineyard.

⁴What more was there to do for my vineyard that I have not done in it?

When I expected it to yield grapes, why did it yield wild grapes?

⁵And now I will tell you

what I will do to my vineyard. I will remove its hedge,

and it shall be devoured;

I will break down its wall, and it shall be trampled down.

⁶I will make it a waste;

it shall not be pruned or hoed, and it shall be overgrown with briers and thorns;

I will also command the clouds that they rain no rain upon it.

⁷For the vineyard of the LORD of hosts

is the house of Israel,

and the people of Judah

are his pleasant planting;

he expected justice,

but saw bloodshed;

righteousness,

but heard a cry!

After the reading the reader may say: The Word of the Lord

C: Thanks be to God.

<u>Scripture Poetry</u> Psalm 80:9-20 (read responsively)

- D: Restore to us, God of might, the light of your presence, and we shall be saved.
- C: You brought a vine from Egypt, cleared out nations to plant it; you prepared the ground and made it take root to fill the land.
- D: It overshadowed the mountains, towered over the mighty cedars,
- C: stretched its branches to the sea, its roots to the distant river.
- D: Why have you now torn down its walls? All who pass by steal the grapes, wild boars tear up its roots, beasts devour its fruit.
- C: Turn our way, God of might, look down from heaven; tend this vine you planted, cherish it once more.
- D: May those who slashed and burned it wither at your rebuke.
- C: Rest your hand upon your chosen one who draws strength from you.
- D: We have not turned from you. Give us life again and we will invoke your name.
- C: Restore to us, Lord God of might, the light of your presence, and we shall be saved.

Second Reading Philippians 3:4b-14

E: [Paul writes] even though I, too, have reason for confidence in the flesh. If anyone else has reason to be confident in the flesh, I have more: ⁵circumcised on the eighth day, a member of the people of Israel, of the tribe of Benjamin, a Hebrew born of Hebrews; as to the law, a Pharisee; ⁶as to zeal, a persecutor of the church; as to righteousness under the law, blameless. ⁷Yet whatever gains I had, these I have come to regard as loss because of Christ. ⁸More than that, I regard everything as

loss because of the surpassing value of knowing Christ Jesus my Lord. For his sake I have suffered the loss of all things, and I regard them as rubbish, in order that I may gain Christ ⁹and be found in him, not having a righteousness of my own that comes from the law, but one that comes through faith in Christ, the righteousness from God based on faith. ¹⁰I want to know Christ and the power of his resurrection and the sharing of his sufferings by becoming like him in his death, ¹¹if somehow I may attain the resurrection from the dead. ¹²Not that I have already obtained this or have already reached the goal; but I press on to make it my own, because Christ Jesus has made me his own. ¹³Beloved, I do not consider that I have made it my own; but this one thing I do: forgetting what lies behind and straining forward to what lies ahead, ¹⁴I press on toward the goal for the prize of the heavenly call of God in Christ Jesus.

After the reading the reader may say: The Word of the Lord

C: Thanks be to God.

Gospel Acclamation (John 15:5)

C: Alleluia. I am the vine, you are the branches. Those who abide in my and I in them bear much fruit. Alleluia.

Gospel Reading John 15:1-17

The gospel is announced:

P: The Holy Gospel according to St. John the 15th chapter.

C: Glory to you O Lord.

[Jesus said] "I am the true vine, and my Father is the vinegrower. ²He removes every branch in me that bears no fruit. Every branch that bears fruit he prunes to make it bear more fruit. ³You have already been cleansed by the word that I have spoken to you. ⁴Abide in me as I abide in you. Just as the branch cannot bear fruit by itself unless it abides in the vine, neither can you unless you abide in me. ⁵I am the vine, you are the branches. Those who abide in me and I in them bear much fruit, because apart from me you can do nothing. ⁶Whoever does not abide in me is thrown away like a branch and withers; such branches are gathered, thrown into the fire, and burned. ⁷If you abide in me, and my words abide in you, ask for whatever you wish, and it will be done for you. ⁸My Father is glorified by this, that you bear much fruit and become my disciples.

⁹As the Father has loved me, so I have loved you; abide in my love. ¹⁰If you keep my commandments, you will abide in my love, just as I have kept my Father's commandments and abide in his love. ¹¹I have said these things to you so that my joy may be in you, and that your joy may be complete. ¹²"This is my commandment, that you love one another as I

have loved you. ¹³No one has greater love than this, to lay down one's life for one's friends. ¹⁴You are my friends if you do what I command you. ¹⁵I do not call you servants any longer, because the servant does not know what the master is doing; but I have called you friends, because I have made known to you everything that I have heard from my Father. ¹⁶You did not choose me but I chose you. And I appointed you to go and bear fruit, fruit that will last, so that the Father will give you whatever you ask him in my name. ¹⁷I am giving you these commands so that you may love one another.

P: The Gospel of the Lord

C: Praise to you O Christ.

F: Gardener of all life, as you trim and shape us for your purpose may we place our prayers into your hands.

C: We trust that new seeds will grow from tired and empty thoughts.

F: These things and whatever else we need we pray in Jesus' name.

C: Amen.
