Jeremiah – Dirty Underwear September 26, 2021 10:30 Service of the Word

God told the prophet Jeremiah to buy a linen loincloth and use it as a symbol for God's relationship with the people of Israel. A linen loincloth was the equivalent of underwear today. Jeremiah is instructed to do things with it that thoroughly ruin it. Though a Bible passage about ruining underwear is a bit comic, it is a sad but significant image of God's relationship with the people.

First Reading Jeremiah 13:1-11

B: Thus said the LORD to me, "Go and buy yourself a linen loincloth, and put it on your loins, but do not dip it in water." ²So I bought a loincloth according to the word of the LORD, and put it on my loins. ³And the word of the LORD came to me a second time, saying, ⁴"Take the loincloth that you bought and are wearing, and go now to the Euphrates, and hide it there in a cleft of the rock." ⁵So I went, and hid it by the Euphrates, as the LORD commanded me. ⁶And after many days the LORD said to me, "Go now to the Euphrates, and take from there the loincloth that I

commanded you to hide there." ⁷Then I went to the Euphrates, and dug, and I took the loincloth from the place where I had hidden it. But now the loincloth was ruined; it was good for nothing. ⁸Then the word of the LORD came to me: ⁹Thus says the LORD: Just so I will ruin the pride of Judah and the great pride of Jerusalem. ¹⁰This evil people, who refuse to hear my words, who stubbornly follow their own will and have gone after other gods to serve them and worship them, shall be like this loincloth, which is good for nothing. ¹¹For as the loincloth clings to one's loins, so I made the whole house of Israel and the whole house of Judah cling to me, says the LORD, in order that they might be for me a people, a name, a praise, and a glory. But they would not listen. *After the reading the reader may say:* The Word of the Lord **C: Thanks be to God.**

<u>Scripture Poetry</u> Psalm 8 (read responsively)

D: Lord our God, the whole world tells the greatness of your name. Your glory reaches beyond the stars.

- C: Even the babble of infants declares your strength, your power to halt the enemy and avenger.
- D: I see your handiwork in the heavens: the moon and the stars you set in place.
- C: What is humankind that you remember them, the human race that you care for them?

D: You treat them like gods, dressing them in glory and splendor.

C: You give them charge of the earth, laying all at their feet:

D: cattle and sheep, wild beasts, birds of the sky, fish of the sea, every swimming creature. C: Lord our God,

the whole world tells the greatness of your name.

Second Reading Romans 6:1-11

E: What then are we to say? Should we continue in sin in order that grace may abound? ²By no means! How can we who died to sin go on living in it? ³Do you not know that all of us who have been baptized into Christ Jesus were baptized into his death? ⁴Therefore we have been buried with him by baptism into death, so that, just as Christ was raised from the dead by the glory of the Father, so we too might walk in newness of life. ⁵For if we have been united with him in a death like his, we will certainly be united with him in a resurrection like his. ⁶We know that our old self was crucified with him so that the body of sin might be destroyed, and we might no longer be enslaved to sin. ⁷For whoever has died is freed from sin. ⁸But if we have died with Christ, we believe that we will also live with him. ⁹We know that Christ, being raised from the dead, will never die again; death no longer has dominion over him. ¹⁰The death he died, he died to sin, once for all; but the life he lives, he lives to God. ¹¹So you also must consider yourselves dead to sin and alive to God in Christ Jesus.

After the reading the reader may say: The Word of the Lord **C: Thanks be to God.**

Gospel Acclamation (Romans 6:4b)

C: Alleluia. Just as Christ was raised from the dead by the glory of the Father, so we too might walk in newness of life. Alleluia.

Gospel Reading Mark 7:1-7

The gospel is announced: P: The Holy Gospel according to St. Mark the 7th chapter.

C: Glory to you O Lord.

Now when the Pharisees and some of the scribes who had come from Jerusalem gathered around [Jesus], ²they noticed that some of his disciples were eating with defiled hands, that is, without washing them. ³(For the Pharisees, and all the Jews, do not eat unless they thoroughly wash their hands, thus observing the tradition of the elders; ⁴and they do not eat anything from the market unless they wash it; and there are also many other traditions that they observe, the washing of cups, pots, and bronze kettles.) ⁵So the Pharisees and the scribes asked him, "Why do your disciples not live according to the tradition of the

elders, but eat with defiled hands?" ⁶He said to them, "Isaiah prophesied rightly about you hypocrites, as it is written, 'This people honors me with their lips, but their hearts are far from me; ⁷in vain do they worship me, teaching human precepts as doctrines.' *After the reading:* P: The Gospel of the Lord **C: Praise to you O Christ.**

Response to the Word

P: Into your hands, gracious God, we commend all for whom we pray, trusting in your mercy; through Jesus Christ our Savior. **C: Amen.**


