Pastor's Paragraphs

I have two things I want to mention here this month. One is serious and the other more fun. First the serious one. The recent presidential election did nothing to lower the tensions that were building before the election. I suspect the tensions would have continued regardless of the outcome. Whether the election results surprised you or not, we seem to be a nation that is divided. How that division should be addressed is not mine to say. However it should be said that those divisions must be addressed with the God-given integrity of others in mind. Hate speech should never be accepted in our country. Dehumanizing any person is always a sin. It is both our right and our responsibility as Americans, and especially as followers of Christ, to call others to account when their words, actions and desires tear down the value of others. This accountability goes for both our political adversaries as well as our friends. Personally I've heard enough hatred from both sides of the spectrum to be appalled, and I've called people out on it. I hope you'll do the same.

Now for something more light-hearted. Following the church year is always frustrating at this time of year. While our culture is celebrating Christmas from before Thanksgiving all the way through December, the church stubbornly insists that Christmas not be celebrated before December 24th. By then most everyone is so sick of Christmas they just want to quit! To make matters worse there are several holidays in the twelve-day-long Christmas season. These holidays take precedence over the Christmas season, so many years we don't even celebrate Christmas during Christmas!

You may remember from my article last month that we are departing from the church year calendar starting with November 27th. We're going to use what is called a "narrative lectionary" at least until Easter. We'll be reading through the gospel of Matthew from start to

finish by the end of April. This means we'll be focusing on Jesus' birth on December 4th. We'll read about the coming of the magi on December 11th. In other words, worship will be more in sync with what we're experiencing in the world outside of church.

My theologically astute side knows my seminary professors would have my hide for allowing this. My practical side says that textbook righteousness never helped anyone! My practical side is winning, but not entirely. If you've looked ahead on your calendars you know that Christmas Day falls on a Sunday this year. Many people have asked if we'll have just one service. I've said no. Christmas is the festival of the incarnation, coming third behind Good Friday and Easter in importance. It's absurd to cut back on worship when you're celebrating your chief holidays! I hope the light of Christ will be alive and bright in you throughout this holiday season! Blessings,

November Council Highlights

We remain caught up on all bills! Thank you! We approved having a street light installed by RG&E to give light to the church parking lot entrance. There is no installation cost and the annual operating expense will be less than \$200.

The 2017 pledge drive is underway and will conclude on November 20^{th} .

The mortgage interest rate is due for renewal. The Stewardship and Finance committee is working with the Mission Investment Fund to lower the rate slightly. The sanctuary will have U shaped seating for the Advent and Christmas seasons.

A draft budget for 2017 was reviewed.

Three council positions will be opening at the beginning of 2017.

Nuts and Bolts (Cont.) 11/20 Congregational Meeting Decisions

Two actions were approved at the special congregational meeting on November 20th. One, we conditionally approved becoming a "host congregation" for the Family Promise program to aid homeless families. The condition is to know the costs we may incur in order to meet local regulations for the building and its use. Two, we approved hiring Springline Design to create engineering drawings for a bell tower. Their design will be presented at the annual meeting for approval. Several constitutional amendments were presented and will also be voted on at the annual meeting. For the full text of these amendments please see Pastor Jon.
