Pastor's Paragraphs

I'm tired of the Christmas season, and it's not even Thanksgiving yet! (Maybe I'm turning into a real humbug!) I suppose some of it is seeing Christmas merchandise in stores since before Halloween. And there has been Christmas music on the airwayes for weeks now. I truly get tired of the run up to Christmas being the entire 4th quarter of the year! Yet there is something more. I think our culture has lost the ability to find fulfillment in just about everything. And so we start preparing for holidays earlier and earlier. We add more hype and decorations; hoping that will help catch the feeling of a holiday. Yet it eludes us. Many people now decorate for Halloween more than they used to for Christmas. And for Christmas they go to absurdity! If all our work and decorating led to a truly celebrating a holidays I'd say it was all well and good. But it feels like people are exhausted before the holiday even arrives. And before it arrives their already looking forward to the next thing. This year I noticed Halloween decorations showing up in the clearance aisles a week before October 31. Last year I saw Valentines cards and hearts hitting the shelves in mid-December. I'm not criticizing retailers. They know their customers, and they know when to put what on the shelves to maximize sales. When people are shopping for Valentines day cards and candy a week before Christmas that should tell you something!

Christmas can give us a good antidote to all this. Christmas reminds us that it isn't about lights, or parties or cookies, or who has the biggest blow-up lawn decoration on your street. Christmas is about relationships; pure and simple relationships at that.

I'm sure you know the Christmas story well enough to know how simple and plain it was. We do well not to add more glory to our Christmas pageants than there really was. The Christmas story we're most familiar with comes from Luke's gospel. Luke starts off that story by reminding us where the story is NOT taking place and who is NOT being notified. It is not taking

place in Rome or any major city – not even in mediocre Jerusalem. It is taking place in Bethlehem, a town of no account. The Roman emperor and the provincial governor aren't told about it. Shepherds were. We might say the appearance of the "heavenly host" was a major bit of glory, and that would be right. But since they only appeared to shepherds, it served no grand purpose.

We can learn two things from the Christmas story. One, God comes to us in the ordinary, not the spectacular. Two, God is interested in routine day-to-day relationships with people. God does not require the red carpet treatment, or fanfares, or decorations. God simply wants to be in relationship with people.

If you are like me in that you are tired of Christmas already, remember that it's based in God's desire for relationship with you. From there we build relationship with each other. If you want a good and meaningful holiday season don't focus on the decorations, the cookies, and the parties. Instead focus on being with the people around you: your family, your neighbors, your friends, and others. Don't work to make it be a special time with them. Allow it to be an ordinary time with them. It's mean less stress, more relationship building, and a more fulfilling holiday.




Stewardship Drive

- -Don Curtis, who has moved into a nursing home.


