Pastor's Paragraphs

My daughter Emma recently had an assignment for a class where she was to read articles from two philosophers. One philosopher argued that humans are by nature good. The other argued that people are by nature bad. Emma was then to write her own paper about which of the two philosophers she thought made a better argument.

While philosophers have debated for ages over whether humans are good or bad, our faith response is that people are by nature bad. Or perhaps more precisely, people are by nature turned away from God. Instead of seeking wholeness of life in God people look elsewhere; usually substituting power, money, comforts, sex or other things for God. Their misguided quest for fulfillment then leads to all sorts of evils. Of course this does not mean that all people of faith are automatically good, and all atheists are automatically bad. The world does not work

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in such cut and dry categories. However, a person whose life is truly turned toward God will be driven by love and not dominated by fear or greed.

The season of Lent comes to us early in February. Years ago the Gospel Acclamation for Lent was, "Return to the Lord your God, for he is gracious and merciful. Slow to anger and abounding in steadfast love." (Joel 2:13) Lent is our annual time to remember that if left to our own devices we would turn away from God. It is God's own work that brings us to him in the first place. And it is God's own work that keeps us facing towards him. The season of Lent is our annual time to consciously return to God. We examine our lives and ask ourselves in what ways have we strayed? In what ways have we sought fulfillment in places other than our God's promises? In what ways are we trying to find meaning in life that is not God?

When we take the disciplines of Lent seriously we find ourselves truly ready to celebrate what comes at the end of Lent – the celebration of the resurrection! Then resurrection is not just a story from the past and a vague hope for the future. It becomes the certainty we build our lives upon. Only a person fully oriented towards God can appreciate the full impact of God's goodness. May your Lenten journey bring you to such a place.

Sanctuary Seating

During Lent the sanctuary seats will be set up in a more traditional arrangement with everyone facing the front. This is because Lent is a penitential time and our focus goes to our broken relationship with God and our need for God's forgiveness. For Easter the seats will go to a U shape arrangement. This gives focus to baptism and the paschal candle which burns every Sunday in Easter.

Lenten Worship

For Lent we are adding mid-week worship services on Wednesdays. They start at 6:00 with a soup and bread supper, then a half-hour worship service starts at 6:30. This year our services will focus on faith issues people often misunderstand. The schedule is: 2/17 What happens after death? 2/24 What guides your life? Is it faith or culture? 3/2 Grace and freewill 3/9 Salvation for nonbelievers? 3/16 The problem of pain These sermons will also be posted on the website.

Give Up Lint for Lent

This bizarre collection is again part of our Lenten journey. If you have trouble giving something up for Lent, this will be your easiest discipline ever! There is a collection box in the Gathering Area for you to put your **dryer lint, used dryer sheets, old crayons and stubs of candles.** This worthless stuff (and somewhat gross) will be melted together and burnt on the fire at the sunrise service on Easter. This Lent give up your most worthless stuff so that God can turn it into heat and light!

Holy Yoga Returns

Holy Yoga is again being offered at our church on Monday mornings at 10:00. Holy Yoga combines the physical movements and disciples of yoga with a Christian worship experience. Jennifer Edwards, one of the instructors from the last time we had this, is again leading the experience. There is no cost to visit a session and try it out. World Hunger Barns

Last year we gave everyone a piggy bank to raise money for the ELCA Good Gifts program. Money raised was used to buy pigs for poor families across the world. They raise and breed the pigs, giving them a start at being self-sufficient.

We could do pigs again, but we thought we'd go for some variety. Goats are even more versatile than pigs. Goats can thrive in the harshest conditions, able to eat grass, brush, garbage and just about anything! In return they give milk, offspring, and meat. Goats are among the most preferred animals a family can receive. So this year we'll raise money for goats!

A goat costs about \$50 so we're asking each family in the church to take a collection box and put in \$25, or half the money for a goat. Sorry, there aren't cute "goaty banks" similar to last year's piggy banks, but our banks are barn shaped this year!



Church Orchard

We'll be planting 20 fruit trees on the church property to grow fruit for the food cupboard. They will cost \$30 each. It will be four to five years before they grow large enough to bear fruit, and no one is blind to the amount of work productive trees required. Pruning and harvesting probably won't be a problem. We can do that as congregation-wide events However, routine spraying will require some ongoing commitment. We have some ideas but ultimately we'll cross that bridge when we come to it. 

Annual Meeting

The annual congregational meeting was held on Sunday January 24 after the 10:30 service. Here were the actions taken:

-Tom Kurilovitch, Beth Schroeder and Cindy Swigart were elected to serve on council.

-The 2016 budget as printed in the annual report passed without amendment.

-An expenditure of up to \$12,000 from the capital fund was approved for the purchase of a new commercial lawn mower.

-An expenditure of up to \$15,000 from the capital fund for renovations to the fellowship hall was tabled for the church council and property committee to more fully develop a renovation plan.
