Pastor's Paragraphs

October 31, 2017 marks the 500th Anniversary of the Protestant Reformation. Though legend suggests Martin Luther posted his famous 95 Thesis on the door of the church doors in Wittenburg on that date, this is most certainly not true. What did indeed happen is that he mailed the 95 Thesis to Albert of Brandenburg, the Archbishop of Mainz. Luther had made one very critical mistake. He thought Albert was unaware of the issues that were raised in the 95 Thesis. However, it appears that Albert was very much aware of what was going on! Albert's response to the 95 Thesis was deliberate and methodical; employing legal and religious experts. All was done in good order and according to proper protocol. Unbeknownst to the archbishop and to Luther big things were stirring that were far beyond their control.

Never underestimate or overestimate the consequences of your actions. You may do something that seems of monumental proportions but have it come to nothing. Or you may do something so ordinary that it doesn't stand out at all. Then in time it becomes a turning point in history. About 1500 years before Luther created the 95 Thesis an unknown Jew from Nazareth walked by the Sea of Galilee and invited four fishermen to follow him. It's hard to think of something more mundane than that! Yet no one doubts that that simple invitation of Jesus to Andrew, Peter, James, and John changed the world!

God's work is big and important every day. God has big tasks and small tasks to do, and he asks us to do them. We just don't normally realize what is going on! Some

things will make the news, but most will not. You might remember these verses from 1 Corinthians 1:26-31 because we recently read them at the 10:30 service: "Consider your own call, brothers and sisters: not many of you were wise by human standards, not many were powerful, not many were of noble birth. But God chose what is foolish in the world to shame the wise; God chose what is weak in the world to shame the strong; God chose what is low and despised in the world, things that are not, to reduce to nothing things that are, so that no one might boast in the presence of God. he is the source of your life in Christ Jesus, who became for us wisdom from God, and righteousness and sanctification and redemption, in order that, as it is written, 'Let the one who boasts, boast in the Lord'."

The Church continues. The Reformation continues. God's work continues. Pick up every task with joy knowing that God is at work thought what you do. Blessings,
