Pastor's Paragraphs

As I'm writing this we're in the midst of the impeachment trial for our nation's president. While I certainly have my opinions, I've always tried to be able to see the "other side" of arguments. However, that seems to be getting tougher and tougher – at least in the realm of government. I used to feel I could gain perspective by truly listening to those who disagree with me. While I may not swing to their point of view, I would come away with a greater appreciation for the complexity of the problem. Not so much anymore though. Perhaps I'm getting impatient, or perhaps the rhetoric is becoming more extreme. My mind quickly jumps to: "How could you possibly be associated with that point of view?!?" It is just much harder to keep an open mind.

Lea Schweitz, Professor and Director of the Zygon Center for Religion and Science at the Lutheran School of Theology in Chicago, is known to call some problems, "wicked problems." By that label she does not mean they are particularly heinous. Rather, she is referring to problems that cannot be simply solved with legislation and then forgotten. These are problems that require a solution today, then an evaluation of how the solution worked, then the solution revised over and over again in the future. These are long term problems that take ongoing work and open mindedness.

I believe many issues in our nation fall into this category of problems. That goes for health care, agriculture, immigration, race relationships, trade policies, international politics, and on and on goes the list.

The world's problems have no easy answers. No political party can pass a law, claim victory, and then walk into the sunset forever triumphant. The challenge for our elected officials (and us as citizens) is to stay engaged in the problems, keep listening, have some humility, and keep trying. We're smart. We're strong. We can do this!

In Romans 13:1 St. Paul writes, "Let every person be subject to the governing authorities; for there is no authority except from God, and those authorities that exist have been instituted by God." He goes on to say that the government is God's authority on earth to keep evil in check. In 13:4 Paul says the government is God's servant for *our* good. In a sense Paul sees the government creating a space for the work of Christians to be accomplished and the gospel to spread.

In Paul's day the small churches had no influence over the powerful Roman government at any level. It certainly wasn't a democracy! They just had to accept and trust. Our situation is quite different. We have the right to vote and our nation wields global influence. If the government is to truly be God's authority on earth then we need to stay engaged. We cannot disconnect. And we cannot close our ears to messages we do not want to hear. I have struggled for years with both of our major political parties. Quite frankly I can't stand either one of them. While I like any number of our local leaders from both parties, at a national level I find them to be out of touch, highly corrupt, and not truly interested in rolling up their sleeves and getting the dirty work done. Nevertheless, both have valuable perspectives.

If you, like me, are becoming jaded to the whole situation, I invite you to keep trying. Keep thinking critically. Keep listening. The "wicked problems" will never improve as long as the answers are more aimed at political gain than real good. We have both the privilege and the responsibility to be a part of government. We fail when we give in to wanting simple solutions.

Regardless of what our government does, our role as Christians does not change. Our role is to spread the good news of God's love throughout the world. We do that through the way we speak. We do that through the way we listen. We do that in the way we engage in politics. And we do that in the way we interact with others each and every day. May you have the insight, the strength, and the courage to face the struggles ahead. Blessings,


The combination costs \$60. We'd like to collect enough to send 6 of these. Look for this year's coin banks to appear in the Gathering Area late in February.


