Pastor's Paragraphs

In worship on December 31st we'll begin reading through Mark's gospel. By Easter we'll have read the whole thing. Just like we did with Matthew's gospel some Sundays we'll read long passages and sometimes just a few verses.

Mark's gospel is my favorite of the four in the Bible. His writing is earthy and raw. Contrast him with Matthew, which has a sophisticated structure; or Luke which has a strong political/economic agenda; or John with his high Greek education. In Mark's gospel Jesus does things like spiting and making mud. He gets mad. He rejects some people. He destroys a huge herd of pigs. He curses a fig tree for not having figs. (Of course it didn't have figs! It wasn't fig season!)

Mark's gospel hits the ground running. He doesn't fool around with stars and stables and angels and wise men. We start off chapter 1 by suddenly meeting John the Baptist. Before the chapter is done Jesus has been baptized, spent time in the wilderness, called the first disciples, cast out demons, healed a bunch of people and completed a preaching tour. By the time chapter 2 is over Jesus is in conflict with the disciples of John the Baptist, Pharisees, and the forces of evil! That list will keep growing the farther we go. Yet we'll also find Jesus' love and generosity in full flow. We'll discover just how radical God's love is.

Mark is a playful writer. He's going to yank the rug out from under us many times. Every time we think we can predict how Jesus will act he does something different. It's all part of how he wants to teach you about Jesus. And just as Mark doesn't bother telling us about Jesus' birth, he also doesn't bother telling us about the resurrected Jesus! The story ends with an empty tomb and women running away not telling anyone.

The ending is so disturbing that other authors have added conclusions of their own. If you look it up in your Bible you'll probably find two or maybe three alternate endings included. But don't be fooled. Mark ended his gospel exactly where he wanted. And I mean exactly! Not one word too few and not one word too many. You may remember me preaching about this before. The gospel ends with an incomplete sentence. The gospel also begins with the second half of an incomplete sentence. You don't have to be a literary genius to realize you're supposed to put the two halves together!

Mark's final twist is that the story is a circle. There is no beginning and there is no end. He wants your life to become caught up in the life of Jesus forever.

So, I invite you to enter the fast-paced and unpredictable world of the Gospel According to St. Mark. We'll explore many of its twists and turns, but there are so many we'll have to let many unexplored. For those Sundays you miss it's always easy to catch up. Just pick up your own Bible at home, or get it online! Blessings, Pastor Jon

Church Constitution Update

At the annual meeting on January 28 we'll be voting on updates to our constitution. Most of the changes are small technicalities and clarifications recommended by the ELCA. Two changes could have an impact. First, we are changing the way we determine a quorum for a congregational meeting. The current constitution requires forty people. We are proposing that be changed to 30% of average worship attendance. That number will still be roughly 40 people, but it will adjust with the size of the congregation. The second change allows us to create a role of "Seasonal Members" if we choose. This is mostly for snowbirds who wish to be active in more than one congregation. The full description is in section C8.02 of the proposed constitution.

If you receive your newsletter by email you should have also received an electronic version of the proposed constitution. If you receive your newsletter by mail please ask Pastor Jon for a paper copy. The proposed constitution needs to be passed by a two-thirds majority at two congregational meetings, one of those being an annual meeting. This will be the first vote. Please talk to Pastor Jon if you have any questions.


2018 Annual Meeting




In our world today, the rulers of nations have many titles. There are kings and queens, presidents and prime ministers, and many others.
