#### Pastor's Paragraphs

Epiphany is a major church holiday. However, it is often ignored unless its date - January 6 – falls on a Sunday. This year it does! While Epiphany is a Christian holiday, some aspects of it trace to long before Christianity existed. Egyptian records all the way back to 1996 B.C. show they celebrated a night festival on January 5-6 as the birth of the god Aenon (Osiris) from Kore the virgin. Early Christian celebrations of Epiphany show many parallels to these Egyptian practices.

For us Epiphany specifically marks the visit of the Wise Men to Jesus. This is a much bigger deal than just some foreigners showing up to give baby gifts! The Wise Men traveled from far-away lands to see Jesus. The word epiphany means, "a sudden striking insight, often the revelation of a god". The Wise Men's visit has come to mark the revealing of Jesus' birth to the whole the world. The three gifts have meanings. Gold is a gift fit for a king. Frankincense is an incense or perfume used in religious rituals. It is a gift fit for a high priest. Myrrh is a strange and unnerving gift. In Jesus' time it was used as a burial spice – an ominous thing to give the parents of a newborn.

The Bible tells us nothing about the Wise Men other than they came from the East. Church traditions added many things about them, most notably that there were three of them. By the 8<sup>th</sup> Century Christians had given them names: Gaspar (or Caspar), Melchior, and Balthasar. Much of the way we celebrate Epiphany today comes from the 8<sup>th</sup> Century.

I encourage you to do three of those ancient Epiphany celebrations in your home after you arrive home from worship on January 6. We'll do a couple of these in worship too. First, use chalk to write the mark of the Wise Men on your front door (or the frame around it). That mark is: 20 + C + M + B + 19. The numbers are for the year -2019. The plus signs are crosses. The letters are the initials of the Wise Men. They are also the first letters of the words of an ancient house blessing:

"Christus Mansionem Benedicat," or in English, "May Christ bless this house." The mark of the Wise Men is asking for Christ's blessing on your home in the year 2019.

The second thing is to create a king cake. Many people associate this with Mardi Gras but it is actually an Epiphany thing. You can find lots of recipes online for king cakes but a simple white cake is perfectly fine. Hide a tiny plastic baby figurine in the cake batter. It is a sign of good luck to the person who gets the piece with the baby. If you're like me, you'll grab any excuse to eat cake!

Finally, continue the house blessing beyond the front door. I don't have room in this article to write it all out, but our church has blessings for every room of the house – including bathrooms and laundry closets! If you're interested let me know and I'll print off a copy or email it to you. God's blessings to you and your homes as we celebrate Epiphany on January 6!

#### FPOC 2<sup>nd</sup> Annual Comfort Food Cook Off March 2 3-5pm


Save the date! We'll have three locations again this year: Clifton Springs, Geneva and Canandaigua. More details to come!




