Pastor's Paragraphs



The immigration issue of separating children from their parents is all over the news right now. I'm usually reluctant to wade into such waters for two reasons. One, what the news decides is the pressing issue of the day may not really be the biggest thing to focus on. Other issues that are every bit or more important are then left on the sidelines. And two, issues are more complex than the news presents. I'm hesitant to share a pastoral opinion about something I don't fully understand. Again, the news decides the information we will or will not have, and that is often dependent upon the bias of the news organization. I certainly have my personal opinions, but I want to speak with more solidly grounded authority than that!

Still though, the separation of children from their parents is getting almost universal condemnation from all religious groups in our country, even those normally loyal to President Trump. The idea of treating people who are often fleeing for their lives as criminals and separating them from their children has crossed a line in the minds of many Americans. I'm glad to see that, because I seldom do.

If you were study the social and political statements of the Evangelical Lutheran Church in America (ELCA) you would discover that our nation's policies – whether the Republicans or the Democrats are in charge – violate almost everything the ELCA stands for. Our nation's economic policies, social policies, international policies, environmental policies, and just about everything else show they are driven by things like greed, fear, ignorance, short-sightedness, and laziness. Rarely do

you find policies that call upon us as citizens to be hard-working, constructive, and sacrificial.

As you are hit with an endless barrage of information designed to play on your fears, or win your vote, or tell you what you want to hear but keep the fullness of reality hidden, keep in mind that you are a child of God. You are sinner in need of God's grace. The only thing you need fear is God. And while God is a judge to be feared, God promises to be gracious to those who love him. While our political leaders are reluctant to call us to what God calls us to be, I won't be so reluctant. Our scriptures easily give us the principles to live by. These are the principles we should live by as individuals, and the things we should push our country to operate by as citizens of a democracy. Here are just two passages as examples:

Philippians 4:8-9

"Finally beloved, whatever is true, whatever is honorable, whatever is just, whatever is pure, whatever is pleasing, whatever is commendable, if there is any excellence and if there is anything worthy of praise, think about these things. Keep on doing the things that you have learned and received and heard and seen in me, and the God of peace will be with you."

Galatians 5:22-25

The fruit of the Spirit is love, joy, peace, patience, kindness, generosity, faithfulness, gentleness, and self-control. There is no law against such things. And those who belong to Christ Jesus have crucified the flesh with its passions and desires. If we live by the Spirit, let us also be guided by the Spirit."




