Pastor's Paragraphs

I also want to say thank you for the twenty years of journeying we have had together as a congregation. Certainly not every moment has been pleasant, but it has been a fulfilling and rewarding time. We have accomplished some big things, like building a sanctuary and bell tower! We have also experienced the deaths of some long-time beloved members. Many old traditions have ended and many new things have come into place. All of that keeps life and ministry interesting.

Perhaps the biggest question is what will things be like twenty years from now? I hate to always be the bearer of bad news, but we all know that religions in America are declining steeply; not just Christianity. The sad truth is that as people become more affluent they no longer see a need for faith. They fool themselves into thinking they don't need God.

The statisticians at the central offices of the Evangelical Lutheran Church in America (ELCA) recently released trend reports showing a steep decline for the ELCA. If those trends continue there will no longer be an ELCA in twenty years! Concurring is the April 27, 2017 issue of the Washington Post predicting the extinction of mainline protestant churches by the year 2040.

That is certainly something to be concerned about, but I do not worry overly much. The church is God's, not ours. God will get done what God wants to get done regardless. However, we still have the privilege of being God's children. We are the people called by God to

continue to work for God's purposes. Whether trends and spreadsheets show growth or decline, we continue work for God's kingdom. We'll do that for the next twenty years, and unless God calls creation to its close, for many years beyond!

Highlights from Synod Assembly

The 32nd Assembly of the Upstate New York Synod of the Evangelical Lutheran Church in America was held May 30 – June 1 at the Rochester Convention Center. St. John's was represented by Pastor Jon and Linda Flood. Worship and Witness and Fellowship events occurred throughout the event. Of special note:

- A. The focus of the Treasurer's Report on the ongoing need for Mission Dollars from the member congregations to the Synod for use around the world. St. John's was credited with contributing \$8,000 in 2018.
- B. A Lutheran Witness During Slavery in the United States of America, an interesting presentation by Rev. Dr. Julius Carroll and Rev. Dr. Kenneth Simurro with video support.
- C. A report by the Women of the ELCA. Of note to me, the Upstate NY Synod Women of the ELCA 2019 Convention "And God said . . . Walk a Faithful Journey" to be held October 4-6 at Notre Dame Retreat House.
- D. A workshop Black/White Churches: Addressing Racism with a great reading list
- E. A beginning attempt at an open, on the floor discussion of the declining numbers in the churches of the Synod and the future of our churches and
- F. Finally. the collection of approximately \$40,000 for World Hunger during the Assembly

If there are questions, please ask. Pastor would be much more knowledgeable than me but I do represent the layperson's viewpoint.


