Pastor's Paragraphs

You may have seen the recent Pew Research poll on religion in America. Its findings are unnerving, but not surprising. (You can see it online at pewforum.org under the religion tab.) All church denominations are steeply declining all across the nation and among all age groups. In regards to religion, the only group that grew significantly was those who said they have no religious affiliation.

How are we to understand this? If we are to live by Jesus' Great Commission, which is to make disciples of all nations, what does such a decline mean? Is our faith in vain? Are we doing something wrong? Has God abandoned us?

These are tough questions, but I think they slip into our minds in some form or another. In response we are wise

to remember that both the church and the future are in God's hands. God's will is accomplished no matter what.

I also think we are wise to recognize the fullness of the battle we are facing. The church in America is not failing for a lack of a good marketing strategy. Nor is it failing for a lack of management or commitment or anything like that. Fundamental shifts have happened in society, and as the Pew research indicates, people simply no longer care about faith. Other studies show that narcissism is rising steeply. Inasmuch as it is possible to measure narcissism, tests suggest that the number of people with a narcissistic personality disorder doubled in the first ten years of the 21st century. I like to use the word "affluenza" to describe the root problem of spreading faith in America. The more comforts and possessions people have the less they feel they need God. You'll remember Jesus said how hard it is for the wealthy to enter the kingdom of God. If a person sees no point to faith, no amount of marketing on our part will change their minds. But we don't quit either. We don't quit because people really do need faith, even if they don't know it.

There is a serious shortage of truth and authenticity in our society today. There is also a shortage of things that are dependable and things that last. All of these are areas our Christian faith gives us in great measure. No matter what happens around us, we hold firmly to the truth and dependability of God. We do that to not only hang onto our own faith, but it is also a witness to others. Maybe it isn't an outright evangelism strategy, but being an honest, authentic and loving person is a breath of fresh air in our society today. And that makes for a very appealing witness to faith. 




The Great Fondue!
