Pastor's Paragraphs

Are people naturally good or are they naturally bad? That is a question people have been asking for ages. My answer is that people are good at convincing themselves they are good! Most everyone wants to think he or she is basically good. When we do something that might be considered bad we usually make excuses to justify it. Sometimes we tell ourselves we're choosing the "least worst" option. Maybe people do tend to be "good" when it comes to making conscious decisions, but a lot of what makes us who we are happens underneath our consciousness.

If people were deeply and truly good: -they could be counted on to make healthy choices, right?

-they would consistently make choices for the benefit of their whole community and not just themselves, right? -they would consider the impact of their lives on the environment and only do things that are for the best of the whole earth, right?

If people were deeply and truly good there wouldn't be societal problems with obesity and cholesterol. And our communities wouldn't have abject poverty. Garden Project Planting


