Pastor's Paragraphs

If things continue to go as they are it might be possible for us to resume some form of in-person worship in July. The church council is at work exploring options and considering changes that will have to be made. One thing I'm quite certain that will continue is online worship. While I don't know exactly what that will look like I believe it will be blending of online and in person. So, for example, some of the readers may be in the sanctuary and some will be online.

The question of celebrating communion is complicated. I like to make a comparison with having a Super Bowl party. For a Super Bowl party you need three things: the game, food, and friends. Take away any one of those parts and you come up short. It just isn't a Super Bowl party. Now consider communion. There are three things as well: gathering of people, the bread & wine, and the promise of Jesus (spoken part of the communion service). Take away any of those three and it just isn't communion anymore.

Some congregations are doing it online. That can work, but you don't really have in-person community. Some have had worshippers gather in the parking lot. Again, that can work, but you're still missing the inperson community. Church leaders and theologians have shared a lot of thoughts about the whole situation. Our own bishop has been discouraging communion when there is no in-person worship, but he is not criticizing those who do.

When we do resume in-person worship I believe it will be complicated and a bit confusing at first. Safety guidelines will certainly make worship feel different! People are also going to respond unequally. Some will be willing. Some will feel uncomfortable, or unsafe. Some have healthy bodies. Some have compromised health. I think it is important that we value and respect the many ways people will come to their decisions. Ultimately though, I want everyone to be able to receive the tangible grace of God that we have whenever we celebrate communion.

Though this is far from a perfect plan, I am thinking of resuming communion when we resume in-person worship. However it will not only be for those physically present in the building. We will do our best to include those online. To do that we will continue to use the simple bread recipe we've shared the last couple months. Everyone (in-person and online) will at least be eating the same bread. Wine is more tricky. However, we are all still consuming the same "fruit of the vine" that Jesus spoke of at the Last Supper.

God's grace is bigger and more powerful than any virus. It is something we can count on. It is something we can trust. And I'm certain there are ways we can celebrate that grace in communion that is safe, theologically sound, and effective at uniting us as the Body of Christ.

June Bible Readings for Worship

In June we will begin a several month long worship series on the Jewish kings. We'll be reading from 1 & 2 Samuel and 1 & 2 Kings. We don't often think about the time of the Jewish monarchy but it is a sizeable part of the Bible. Even though we are Christian and not Jewish, these stories are a foundational part of Jesus own ministry.

June 7 – Pre-kings; 1 Samuel 8

June 14 – King Saul; 1 Samuel 9-10:8

June 21 – King David as a young man;

1 Samuel 15:34-16:13

June 28 – King David solidifying the nation;

2 Samuel 1:1-16

Shared Bread 1st Sunday of the Month

The first Sunday of the month you are invited to make a the simple bread recipe below and eat it while we are worshipping. While it isn't communion it is our community of faith sharing the same food.

1 cup flour

2 Tbsp oil

1/3 cup water

1/8 tsp salt

1 Tbsp sugar

Mix all ingredients, split into four balls, press each ball on a cookie sheet to the flatness of a sugar cookie, then bake 10-12 minutes in a 425 degree oven

Altar Candles "on Tour"

During the Easter season our baptismal font toured from household to household. Each week a different family poured water into the font at the beginning of worship and led a thanksgiving for baptism.

For the summer Pentecost season the altar candles will be going on tour. Each week a different family will light the candles in their home and lead a prayer that is printed in the bulletin. Even when (if) we are able to return to in-person worship sometime this summer we will certainly be maintaining our Zoom worship services. The candles will continue on tour symbolizing our dispersed congregation.



RED CROSS BLOOD DRIVE

The June 5 blood drive originally scheduled to take place at the Victor United Methodist Church has been relocated to St. John's. The same precautions as the last two drives will be observed: very limited volunteer staff, everyone has their temperature checked before admittance, masks worn by everyone at all times, surfaces wiped down with alcohol wipes after every contact, and only prepackaged rejuvenation snacks. May Council Highlights

Church council held its regular monthly meeting on May 18. Major items were:

- -Approving for confirmation: Abigail Bullwinkle, Olivia DeLeon, Amalia Ireland, Morgan Sackett, Tierney White, and Joseph Wyman
- -In-person worship *may* resume when the area reaches
- "Stage 4" of reopening according to state guidelines.
- The earliest that could be is July.
- -Changing internet service provider from Frontier to Spectrum
- -Approved the installation of a Food Blessing Box on the church property. This will be tended by local neighborhoods and is in cooperation with the Victor Farmington Food Cupboard
- -Conversation about practices and policies for when we are able to return to worshipping together. This includes building changes/improvements, especially the installation of UV lighting in the sanctuary air ducts to purify the air it circulates.

Preventing the Spread of Disease -Building Improvements-

The coronavirus appears to spread many ways, including on surfaces and "aerosol" action. The Property Committee is at work to minimize the possibility of our building spreading the virus. Major things in the works are:

- -Installing UV lights in the sanctuary's HVAC ducts
- -Servicing the ventilation systems in the bathrooms, kitchen, and fellowship hall
- -Purchasing and installing hand sanitizer dispensers in various areas
- -Updating building use guidelines for the congregation and outside groups who use the building


May Bible Trivia Answers:
