# David Solidifies Power

June 28, 2020 10:30 Worship

We continue our journey through the kings of Israel. Today we have the second of four weeks looking at King David. His rise to power was difficult and bloody. When King Saul was killed in battle by the Philistines it may appear that David's path to the throne was clear. Not so. A civil war erupts between those loyal to David and those loyal to Saul. David's forces win; yet still only a part of the country is loyal to him. David will continue to use cunning and might to pull all the tribes under his rule. David's actions are far-reaching. They even create the central controversy Jesus faces centuries later.

#### First Reading 2 Samuel 5:1-20

D: Then all the tribes of Israel came to David at Hebron, and said, "Look, we are your bone and flesh. <sup>2</sup>For some time, while Saul was king over us, it was you who led out Israel and brought it in. The LORD said to you: It is you who shall be shepherd of my people Israel, you who shall be ruler over Israel." <sup>3</sup>So all the elders of Israel came to the king at Hebron; and King David made a covenant with them at Hebron before the LORD, and they anointed David king over Israel. <sup>4</sup>David was thirty years old when he began to reign, and he reigned forty years. <sup>5</sup>At Hebron he reigned over Judah seven years and six months; and at Jerusalem he reigned over all Israel and Judah thirty-three years.

<sup>6</sup>The king and his men marched to Jerusalem against the Jebusites, the inhabitants of the land, who said to David, "You will not come in here, even the blind and the lame will turn you back"—thinking, "David cannot come in here." <sup>7</sup>Nevertheless David took the stronghold of Zion, which is now the city of David. <sup>8</sup>David had said on that day, "Whoever would strike down the Jebusites, let him get up the water shaft to attack the lame and the blind, those whom David hates." Therefore it is said, "The blind and the lame shall not come into the house." <sup>9</sup>David occupied the stronghold, and named it the city of David. David built the city all around from the Millo inwards. <sup>10</sup>And David became greater and greater, for the LORD, the God of hosts, was with him.

# Scripture Poetry Psalm 122

E: With joy I heard them say, "Let us go now to the Lord's house!" And now, Jerusalem,

we stand at your gates.

Jerusalem, the city so built that city and temple are one. To you the tribes go up, every tribe of the Lord.

It is the law of Israel to honor God's name. The seats of law are here, the thrones of David's line.

Pray peace for Jerusalem: happiness for your homes, safety inside your walls, peace in your great houses.

For love of family and friends I say, "Peace be with you!" For love of the Lord's own house I pray for your good.

# Second Reading 2 Samuel 6:1-19

F: David again gathered all the chosen men of Israel, thirty thousand. <sup>2</sup>David and all the people with him set out and went from Baale-judah, to bring up from there the ark of God, which is called by the name of the LORD of hosts who is enthroned on the cherubim. <sup>3</sup>They carried the ark of God on a new cart, and brought it out of the house of Abinadab, which was on the hill. Uzzah and Ahio, the sons of Abinadab, were driving the new cart <sup>4</sup>with the ark of God; and Ahio went in front of the ark. <sup>5</sup>David and all the house of Israel were dancing before the LORD with all their might, with songs and lyres and harps and tambourines and castanets and cymbals.

<sup>6</sup>When they came to the threshing floor of Nacon, Uzzah reached out his hand to the ark of God and took hold of it, for the oxen shook it. <sup>7</sup>The anger of the LORD was kindled against Uzzah; and God struck him there because he reached out his hand to the ark; and he died there beside the ark of God. <sup>8</sup>David was angry because the LORD had burst forth with an outburst upon Uzzah; so that place is called Perez-uzzah, to this day. <sup>9</sup>David was afraid of the LORD that day; he said, "How can the ark of the LORD come into my care?" <sup>10</sup>So David was unwilling to take the ark of the LORD into his care in the city of David; instead David took it to the house of Obed-edom the Gittite. <sup>11</sup>The ark of the LORD remained

in the house of Obed-edom the Gittite three months; and the LORD blessed Obed-edom and all his household.

<sup>12</sup>It was told King David, "The LORD has blessed the household of Obededom and all that belongs to him, because of the ark of God." So David went and brought up the ark of God from the house of Obed-edom to the city of David with rejoicing; <sup>13</sup>and when those who bore the ark of the LORD had gone six paces, he sacrificed an ox and a fatling. <sup>14</sup>David danced before the LORD with all his might; David was girded with a linen ephod. <sup>15</sup>So David and all the house of Israel brought up the ark of the LORD with shouting, and with the sound of the trumpet.

<sup>17</sup>They brought in the ark of the LORD, and set it in its place, inside the tent that David had pitched for it; and David offered burnt offerings and offerings of well-being before the LORD. <sup>18</sup>When David had finished offering the burnt offerings and the offerings of well-being, he blessed the people in the name of the LORD of hosts, <sup>19</sup>and distributed food among all the people, the whole multitude of Israel, both men and women, to each a cake of bread, a portion of meat, and a cake of raisins. Then all the people went back to their homes.

# Gospel Reading John 7:37-44

The gospel is announced:

P: The Holy Gospel according to St. John the 7<sup>th</sup> chapter.

# C: Glory to you O Lord.

<sup>37</sup>On the last day of the [harvest] festival, the great day, while Jesus was standing [in Jerusalem], he cried out, "Let anyone who is thirsty come to me, <sup>38</sup>and let the one who believes in me drink. As the scripture has said, 'Out of the believer's heart shall flow rivers of living water.'" <sup>39</sup>Now he said this about the Spirit, which believers in him were to receive; for as yet there was no Spirit, because Jesus was not yet glorified. <sup>40</sup>When they heard these words, some in the crowd said, "This is really the prophet." <sup>41</sup>Others said, "This is the Messiah." But some asked, "Surely the Messiah does not come from Galilee, does he? <sup>42</sup>Has not the scripture said that the Messiah is descended from David and comes from Bethlehem, the village where David lived?" <sup>43</sup>So there was a division in the crowd because of him. <sup>44</sup>Some of them wanted to arrest him, but no one laid hands on him.
