#### Pastor's Paragraphs

I feel like it's getting impossible for our nation to have a civil conversation about an important issue. It doesn't matter whether it is gun control, or the environment, or our elected leaders, or scientific thought, or health care, or on and on can go the list. People draw up lines and connect themselves to people who think like them. Then they stop listening and start condemning those who disagree with them. Civil debate is a great strength of our culture, but that seems to have gone out the window!

As a pastor it is easy to say that we should all remember to focus on the love of Christ and use that as the foundation of how we treat each other. Indeed that would be a theologically astute answer. However, that would also be pointless. When the church cries "Love, love, love," in our world today it sounds childish and weak. Telling people to be nice to each other is absurd. The world simply steps on 'nice people'.

There is a better way. I've brought that up in a couple sermons and I'm going to repeat it here. We are all joined in our sin – from the sweetest person you know to the most rotten scoundrel you've ever met. We all fall short of the glory of God. We all fail. No one deserves the love God has for us. I like to quote Martin Luther's last written words. They were found in a scrap of paper in a pocket of the clothes he was wearing when he died, "We are beggars. It is true."

For me at least, when I see someone I vehemently disagree with I remember the thing that joins us – that we both need God's grace. No matter how much of an idiot I think someone is, I know that both of us will stand before God unworthy and undeserving. There is no logic to God's grace. There is no controlling it or limiting it. God is God, and God has said that his ultimate nature is self-giving love. If God excludes someone from his grace, that is God's decision. It is no business of mine. My business is to turn to God for help, and to try to witness to the love I find in God.

Don't get the idea that I mean us to act all weak and underserving; and that would solve things. No, I think there is great strength and genuine humility in knowing your brokenness. You can still disagree with someone, and disagree vehemently. As Christians we are to stand up to hatred, greed, and anything that diminishes the value of what God has created. But when you know you need God's grace it takes away the arrogant edge and feeling of superiority that comes from winning an argument. It takes away the desire to step on someone else in order to move yourself up.

Let me conclude with these words from 2 Timothy: "Proclaim the message; be persistent whether the time is favorable or unfavorable; convince, rebuke, and encourage, with the utmost patience in teaching. For the time is coming when people will have itching ears, they will accumulate for themselves teachers to suit their own desires, and will turn away from listening to the truth and wander away to myths." (2 Timothy 4:2-4)

This is truth – you need God's grace. Let that truth lead you always.

#### **April Council Highlights**

- -Reviewed the Financial Secretary's report which shows we have 22 pledges that are under plan totaling \$5701. Quarterly reports should encourage those behind to catch up.
- -Discussed garden project ideas including locating the venue on or closer to church property.
- -Heard plan for a Fellowship outing of a Beer and Wine Tasting Tour in the spring.
- -Learned that Family Promise has \$150,000 of funding toward their start-up costs.
- -Identified actions to close gaps for our committee leadership positions.
- -Determined the plan to evaluate the Pipe Organ from Pittsford that is available to us.
- -Urged Council members to identify congregants not seen in a while and to invite them to church activities.
- -Recognized the web site needs to be modernized with more pictures, blogs, calendar, etc.
- -Considered Evangelism ideas, deciding door to door solicitation was not recommended, but instead bringing music to community centers and focusing on hands-on service projects.
- -Decided to write a record retention policy and to take initial steps to get church records organized.
- -Reviewed performance appraisals for Pastor Jon and Heidi
- -Identified main goals for 2018 to include focus on upgrading our sound and video systems.

All proceeds from this fundraiser are given directly to the Food Cupboard.



Please download information and register ON-LINE at www.FamilyPromiseOntarioCounty.org HIGHLIGHTS The Bed Race is FPOC's major fundraising event. Teams of five (one rider and four runners) will construct an actual bed on wheels and decorate it with the theme of their choice. Teams enter the competition and race their beds, using manpower only, against other teams for awards and prizes. Each team raises money that will support the Family Promise program to help homeless children and their families become sustainably independent.

The racecourse is a straight run approximately 150 yards long along Pier Road.

Awards are given for the most money raised by a team, the fastest bed per division, and the best theme. Additionally, the Most Spirited team and the "Crowd Favorite" also win awards!

**Team Divisions:** (All teams may be combined into the Road Hog Division if not enough have entered separate divisions)

- ➤ Hot Wheels (ages 12 to 14 only) Rider must be at least 12 years old and weigh at least 75 lbs. EVERY team member MUST be between 12-14 years old.
- ➤ Lead Feet (ages 15 to 18 only) Rider must be at least 15 years old and weigh a minimum 0f 100 lbs. EVERY member MUST be between 15-18 years old.
- > Road Hogs (mixed ages 14+) Rider must at least 14 years old and weigh at least 100 lbs. Team members are of mixed ages 14+ years old.
- ➤ Sunday Drivers (runners ages 40+ only) Rider must be 14+ and weigh a minimum of 100 lbs. EVERY RUNNING team member must be 40+ years old.
