#### Pastor's Paragraphs

Ephesians 2:10 says, "For we are what he has made us, created in Christ Jesus for good works, which God prepared beforehand to be our way of life." These words remind us of the purpose of our existence – to do good works. Those good works are not intended to earn God's favor or bring about our salvation. Those good works are the natural response to God's goodness. The challenge these days is, how do we do those good works?

Many people love the idea of leisure. But if you're a person who has been idled these last weeks, or you are retired from work and are now isolated, the idea of leisure may be getting frustrating. Work (and not just a paid job) makes us feel worthwhile. There is great satisfaction in accomplishing things.

When we can't accomplish things all sorts of things can go wrong. I've heard that depression, anxiety, and other mental health problems have gone up. People caught in abusive relationships are being hurt more than ever. Substance abuse is rising. Traffic to internet gambling and pornography sites are going through the roof.

Maybe you are coping well. Maybe you are not. Maybe you are loving the leisure that is before you. Maybe you are working harder than ever. We are a diverse group and experiencing different things. But there is a universal lesson for all of us. Remember these words from St. Paul to the Philippians:

"Beloved, whatever is true, whatever is honorable, whatever is just, whatever is pure, whatever is pleasing, whatever is commendable, if there is any excellence and if there is anything worthy of praise, think about doing these things. Keep on doing the things that you have learned and received and heard and seen in me, and the God of peace will be with you." (Philippians 4:8-9) Blessings,

Holy Communion

The Presiding Bishop, Rev. Elizabeth Eaton, and our synod bishop, Rev. John Macholz, are asking congregations not to have communion when we are unable to worship together. It is difficult, if not impossible, to truly have communion when we cannot actually gather. God's grace is bigger than our abilities or inabilities. God certainly prefers us to be safe rather than reckless.

For the Maundy Thursday service worshippers were encouraged to make a simple bread recipe and enjoy eating it along with some wine (or grape juice) during the service. While it won't be "communion" we will do that again on the first Sunday in May. So, make some bread, grab some wine or grape juice, and have it while we worship. Here's the bread recipe again:

1 cup flour 2 Tbsp oil

1/3 cup water

1/8 tsp salt

1 Tbsp sugar

Mix all ingredients, split into four balls, press each ball on a cookie sheet to the flatness of a sugar cookie, then bake 10-12 minutes in a 425 degree oven

#### **Worship Candles**



Just before worship begins we usually light the candles on the altar. Since we aren't worshipping together you are invited to light a candle in your home when we begin. Of course you may use any candle you wish, but we are making some special ones. Stubs of old altar candles, an old Paschal candle, and some new wax are being melted down and poured into toilet paper tubes to make new candles. These are available at church to pick up. There is a box with them outside the old entrance door. Please only one candle per family.

When we are able to worship together again you are invited to return your candle. It will be melted down yet again and used with the lint we collected during Lent.


