

Genesis 37 – Joseph, Dreams, Coat November 12, 2017 10:30 Service of the Word

The story of Joseph and his dreams and his special coat is one of the best known in the Bible. We'll look at that story today and probably discover some new things about it. At the same time many old lessons will be reinforced.

<u>Gathering Hymn</u> All Are Welcome (For music see Hymn 641 in the Red Hymnal)

 Let us build a house where love can dwell and all can safely live,
 a place where saints and children tell how hearts learn to forgive.
 Built of hopes and dreams and visions, rock of faith and vault of grace; here the love of Christ shall end divisions:

First Reading Genesis 37

A1: Jacob settled in the land where his father had lived as an alien, the land of Canaan. ²This is the story of the family of Jacob. Joseph, being seventeen years old, was shepherding the flock with his brothers; he was a helper to the sons of Bilhah and Zilpah, his father's wives; and Joseph brought a bad report of them to their father. ³Now Israel loved Joseph more than any other of his children, because he was the son of his old age; and he had made him a long robe with sleeves. ⁴But when his brothers saw that their father loved him more than all his brothers, they hated him, and could not speak peaceably to him.

A2: Once Joseph had a dream, and when he told it to his brothers, they hated him even more. ⁶He said to them, "Listen to this dream that I dreamed. ⁷There we were, binding sheaves in the field. Suddenly my sheaf rose and stood upright; then your sheaves gathered around it, and bowed down to my sheaf." ⁸His brothers said to him, "Are you indeed to reign over us? Are you indeed to have dominion over us?" So they hated him even more because of his dreams and his words. ⁹He had another dream, and told it to his brothers, saying, "Look, I have had another dream: the sun, the moon, and eleven stars were bowing down to me."¹⁰But when he told it to his father and to his brothers, his father rebuked him, and said to him, "What kind of dream is this that you have had? Shall we indeed come, I and your mother and your brothers, and bow to the ground before you?" ¹¹So his brothers were jealous of him, but his father kept the matter in mind.

A3: Now his brothers went to pasture their father's flock near Shechem.¹³And Israel said to Joseph, "Are not your brothers pasturing the flock at Shechem? Come, I will send you to them." He answered, "Here I am."¹⁴So he said to him, "Go now, see if it is well with your brothers and with the flock; and bring word back to me." So he sent him from the valley of Hebron. He came to Shechem, ¹⁵and a man found him wandering in the fields; the man asked him, "What are you seeking?" ¹⁶"I am seeking my brothers," he said; "tell me, please, where they are pasturing the flock."¹⁷The man said, "They have gone away, for I heard them say, 'Let us go to Dothan.""

A1: So Joseph went after his brothers, and found them at Dothan. ¹⁸They saw him from a distance, and before he came near to them, they conspired to kill him. ¹⁹They said to one another, "Here comes this dreamer. ²⁰Come now, let us kill him and throw him into one of the pits; then we shall say that a wild animal has devoured him, and we shall see what will become of his dreams." ²¹But when Reuben heard it, he delivered him out of their hands, saying, "Let us not take his life."²²Reuben said to them, "Shed no blood; throw him into this pit here in the wilderness, but lay no hand on him" —that he might rescue him out of their hand and restore him to his father. ²³So when Joseph came to his brothers, they stripped him of his robe, the long robe with sleeves that he wore; ²⁴and they took him and threw him into a pit. The pit was empty; there was no water in it.

A2: Then they sat down to eat; and looking up they saw a caravan of Ishmaelites coming from Gilead, with their camels carrying gum, balm, and resin, on their way to carry it down to Egypt. ²⁶Then Judah said to his brothers, "What profit is it if we kill our brother and conceal his blood? ²⁷Come, let us sell him to the Ishmaelites, and not lay our hands on him, for he is our brother, our own flesh." And his brothers agreed. ²⁸When some Midianite traders passed by, they drew Joseph up, lifting him out of the pit, and sold him to the Ishmaelites for twenty pieces of silver. And they took Joseph to Egypt.

A3: ²⁹When Reuben returned to the pit and saw that Joseph was not in the pit, he tore his clothes. ³⁰He returned to his brothers, and said, "The boy is gone; and I, where can I turn?" ³¹Then they took Joseph's robe, slaughtered a goat, and dipped the robe in the blood. ³²They had the long robe with sleeves taken to their father, and they said, "This we have found; see now whether it is your son's robe or not." ³³He recognized it, and said, "It is my son's robe! A wild animal has devoured him; Joseph is without doubt torn to pieces." ³⁴Then Jacob tore his garments, and put sackcloth on his loins, and mourned for his son many days. ³⁵All his sons and all his daughters sought to comfort him; but he refused to be comforted, and said, "No, I shall go down to Sheol to my son, mourning." Thus his father bewailed him. ³⁶Meanwhile the Midianites

had sold him in Egypt to Potiphar, one of Pharaoh's officials, the captain of the guard.

After the reading the reader may say: The Word of the Lord **C: Thanks be to God.**

<u>Scripture Poetry</u> Psalm 105:7-25 (Read responsively)
A: The Lord is our God, judge of all the earth, who remembers his covenant spoken to a thousand generations:
C: the agreement with Abraham, the oath to Isaac, the firm decree to Jacob, the unending promise to Israel. God said, "I give you a land, Canaan, your inheritance."

A: There were only a few, a small band of nomads, wandering from nation to nation, from one kingdom to another.

C: God tolerated no oppression, rebuked kings on their account. "Touch not my anointed ones, harm not my prophets."

A: God spread famine across the land breaking the very staff of life and sent a man before them, Joseph, sold as a slave.

C: His feet were bound with shackles, his neck with iron. Yet his prophecy came true, proved right by God's word.

A: Pharaoh released him, the ruler of nations set him free, making him master of the palace, steward of all his goods, a model for princes, a teacher of wisdom to elders.

C: Israel journeyed to Egypt, Jacob to the land of Ham. God's people were made fruitful, stronger than their foes, but Egypt was made bitter, eager to enslave them.

Gospel Acclamation (Philippians 2:15,16)

C: Alleluia. Shine like the stars in the world; holding fast to the word of life. Alleluia.

Gospel Reading Matthew 23:1-12

The gospel is announced:

P: The Holy Gospel according to St. Matthew the 23rd chapter.

C: Glory to you O Lord.

Then Jesus said to the crowds and to his disciples, ²^{cc}The scribes and the Pharisees sit on Moses' seat; ³therefore, do whatever they teach you and follow it; but do not do as they do, for they do not practice what they teach. ⁴They tie up heavy burdens, hard to bear, and lay them on the shoulders of others; but they themselves are unwilling to lift a finger to move them. ⁵They do all their deeds to be seen by others; for they make their phylacteries broad and their fringes long. ⁶They love to have the place of honor at banquets and the best seats in the synagogues, ⁷and to be greeted with respect in the marketplaces, and to have people call them rabbi. ⁸But you are not to be called rabbi, for you have one teacher, and you are all students. ⁹And call no one your father on earth, for you have one Father—the one in heaven. ¹⁰Nor are you to be called instructors, for you have one instructor, the Messiah. ¹¹The greatest among you will be your servant. ¹²All who exalt themselves will be humbled, and all who humble themselves will be exalted.

- Let streams of living justice flow down upon the earth; give freedom's light to captives, let all the poor have worth. The hungry's hands are pleading, the workers claim their rights. the mourners long for laughter, the blinded seek for sight. Make liberty a beacon, strike down the iron pow'r; abolish ancient vengeance: proclaim your people's hour.
- * The dreaded disappearance of family and friend; the torture and the silence – the fear that knows no end; the mother with her candle, the child who holds a gun, the old one nursing hatred – all seek release to come. Each candle burns for freedom; each lights a tyrant's fall; each flower placed for martyrs gives tongue to silenced call.
- 2. For healing of the nations, for peace that will not end, for love that makes us lovers, God grant us grace to mend. Weave our varied gifts together; knit our lives as they are spun; on your loom of time enroll us till our thread of life is run. O great weaver of our fabric, bind church and world in one; dye our texture with your radiance, light our colors with your sun.
- 3. Your city's built to music; we are the stones you seek; your harmony is language; we are the words you speak. Our faith we find in service, our hope in others' dreams, our love in hand of neighbor; our homeland brightly gleams.
