Pastor's Paragraphs

It seems as if all eyes are on the Bret Kavanaugh hearing and the accusations that are being made against him. I don't know enough to have an informed opinion about his suitability for the Supreme Court. I do, however, want to address the "boys will be boys" messages I've heard many times recently. It should go without saying that such an attitude runs counter to our Christian understandings. The Bible teaches that all are made in the image of God (Genesis 1:26) and deserve respect as such. Also, our bodies are temples of God (1 Cor. 3:16). The list could go on and on, with numerous teachings that we must honor others and control our own behaviors.

Last year saw the Me Too movement take form, especially drawing attention to sexual harassment of women in the workplace. While I hardly have the power to start another such movement, I think we need a culture-wide movement calling out and rejecting the "boys will be boys" message.

Indeed adolescent boys and young men face many challenges; but our culture should expect them to work through them without violating others. They need good male role models who show ways to be strong, yet who express that strength in constructive ways. They need to learn how to be sexual beings in ways that fully honor the capabilities and gifts of women. These are things men need to teach to each other, especially to young men.

I'm not going to let women off the hook though, for they have also played a role in the current mess. Brene Brown is a nationally recognized therapist who has focused on causes of shame in men and women. Here's an excerpt from an April 26, 2013 article in *The Atlantic*:

'What Brown discovered in the course of her research is that, contrary to her early assumptions, men's shame is not primarily inflicted by other men. Instead, it is the women in their lives who tend to be repelled when men show the chinks in their armor.

"Most women pledge allegiance to this idea that women can explore their emotions, break down, fall apart—and it's healthy," Brown said. "But guys are not allowed to fall apart." Ironically, she explained, men are often pressured to open up and talk about their feelings, and they are criticized for being emotionally walled-off; but if they get too real, they are met with revulsion.'

I agree with Brown's findings. In my own experience as a pastor, men will respect weakness in each other, but women treat weakness in men with revulsion. That also has to change before any real progress can be made.

While most people can look at their younger years and see things that they regret, that does not mean we should wink at that conduct from adolescents/young adults – whether they be male or female. We are people of forgiveness, but not people who look the other way and allow hurtful and abusive behavior to occur.

May God give us both the grace and the sensibility to:

acknowledge our own brokenness, forgive the brokenness of others, hold each other to account, and more forward as God's community of faith. Blessings, Pastor Jon

In October we'll conclude our journey with the Israelites in the wilderness. The month will conclude with the typical texts for Reformation Sunday.


