Pastor's Paragraphs

Summer is rolling towards its end. Lots of people are working to get everything ready for our fall programs. Sunday school, Bible studies, fellowship events and service opportunities all come back on line. This is the typical rhythm for the year. We do lots of things in the fall, winter and spring; then summer is slow. Undoubtedly this pattern developed because of the school year and people's vacation plans. But isn't this cycle somewhat counter to what we are to be about as Christians? Jesus said, "Go therefore and make disciples of all nations, baptizing them in the name of the Father and of the Son and of the Holy Spirit, and teaching them to obey everything I have commanded you." (Matthew 28:19-20) Jesus often taught that we should be ready for his return at every moment and not let the worries and patterns of life distract us. He didn't say we should take the summers off. In St. Paul's letters he often talks

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about the time being short and urges his readers onward with all haste.

2000 years of waiting for Christ's return has taken away our sense of urgency. Indeed how can you stay alert and ready for such a long time? Nevertheless, we cannot allow the patterns of the world dictate the patterns of how we live out the faith God inspires in us. We need to keep in the front of our minds that we are children of God and workers in God's kingdom. That work is ongoing and it is changing and dynamic. Certainly we can take breaks. God is not a merciless slave driver! However faith should establish the patterns of our life. Things have gotten backwards when the patterns of life establish the patterns of our faith.

May you find God's inspiration coming to you new and fresh every day. May you feel God's presence driving you onward into the reality of each new day. May you see each new day not as a part of a pattern but as fresh with possibilities. And most especially, may you be able to look back over your life and see many things that God has accomplished in his kingdom through you.


God's Work, Our Hands Sunday



August Council Meeting Highlights

- 1. Passed a Motion to uphold going forward the 7th Grade level for students entering the Confirmation Class
- 2. Reviewed a proposal to add the position of Sexton (see specific note in Newsletter)

Lawn Mowing Situation/Sexton Proposal

The Ferris mower that we have been using to mow the church property is no longer operational. The engine died, and would cost over \$3000 to replace. The mower is approximately twenty years old, so the Property Committee and Church Council feel as though it is not prudent to incur the expense to replace the engine when something else could go wrong with the mower.

For the remainder of the 2015 mowing season, we intend to use the small riding mower to do the areas immediately adjacent to the church and nearest to the road. The tractor that is traditionally used for the garden project has been generously relocated from the Wymans to church to mow some of the bigger areas (behind the shed and the hillside near the outdoor sanctuary). The tractor is only meant to serve as a stopgap measure to get us through the current year because its primary purpose is for mowing brush, not grass.

We are pursuing the idea of purchasing a piece of equipment that could mow the grass and plow snow. We have obtained multiple quotes from vendors for new and used tractors, with financing options available over the course of several years.

One other component that is under consideration is the possibility of hiring a Sexton to carry out multiple duties, including lawn care, snow removal, and cleaning inside the church.

This proposal is being undertaken to bring these costs under our control, not subjected again to those of a 3rd party contractor. As you may know, we spent significantly on snow removal costs due to last year's frigid winter. If we endure another harsh, wintry season, we do not want to pay per visit for snow plowing & salting services.

There was never a good time for the mower's engine to fail, but this is prompting us to take action and assess the best long-term solution for financial soundness. We intend to propose a recommendation at a special congregational meeting following the late worship service on Sunday, September 20. We look forward to hearing your thoughts, comments, and suggestions.

Bell Tower Update

Earlier this summer, we held a congregational meeting to share information regarding the possibility of erecting a bell tower here at St. John's. The result was to have Church Council complete its due diligence in pursuing a 3-bell tower, including consideration of the purchase of bells. The Church Council stood up a sub-committee to perform due diligence to cover each aspect of this project. Below are the findings.

Finance

We have approximately \$7,000 in the Memorial Fund, primarily donated in memory of Jill Pow and Scott Swigart, that prompted consideration for this project. A few families have offered to cover the remainder of fabrication and erection costs (\$5,500). An additional \$5,000 has been donated. Another significant pledge has been promised if the project moves forward. The daily sponsorship of bells would also account for \$9,000, which would go toward the purchase of the first bell, if approved.

Additional Considerations

- There is no additional insurance premium associated with the erection of a bell tower.
- The tower falls within the allowable height restrictions of the town of Victor (under 40 feet).
- Churches are considered exempt, as far as noise ordinances are concerned.
- We may investigate the possibility of an annual inspection price because Verdin Bell Company has several other customers in the area.

Other Use of Memorial Fund Money

The due diligence sub-committee discussed other ways to use the memorial fund including a waterfall, scholarship, and steeple with one bell. These ideas did not stimulate the same interest as the bell tower project.

Next Steps

We will hold a follow-up congregational meeting on Sunday, September 20, after the late worship service. The intent is to have a motion prepared for the congregation to vote whether to proceed or not with this project.
