Pastor's Paragraphs

I'm currently reading the book *Canoeing the Mountains* by Tod Bolsinger. The title is inspired by the Lewis and Clark expedition, which had to make a dramatic change in their plans when they discovered the Rocky Mountains. They had hoped that once they crossed the continental divide at the headwaters of the Missouri River they'd have a downhill descent to the Pacific Ocean – something they'd be able to travel by canoe. The Rockies were a rude awakening! They had to rethink things and make dramatic changes if they were to complete their mission of reaching the Pacific. The book suggests that a similar rethinking is needed from church leaders if the church is to flourish (or maybe survive) in this century.

I've encountered a number of books and programs like this. Interestingly they have all been created by highly educated white men. And they all suggest that if pastors would develop the precisely right mix of leadership skills the church will flourish.

And it is my opinion that they are all wrong! I criticize all of them for missing the key issue. The key issue is the "log in our eyes" that Jesus talks about. That log is the issue that Jesus talked about more than anything else – money.

I've written this a number of times before, so it will not be news to you. The biggest challenge to faith in America today is money. The biggest reason why the church is declining so steeply is money. The reason the entire social fabric that has endured for generations is unraveling is because of money. We have enough money that we can afford to live as individuals; not needing to share unless we want to. We can buy our lifestyles. We regularly buy comforts and conveniences unheard of just several decades ago. And even though we consider ourselves super busy, the busyness is of life is artificial, not driven by necessity. People spend little of their time meeting the necessities of life: hauling

water, growing and processing food, washing clothes by hand, etc.

The problem with money is that it makes people feel like they have power, like they are in control, like they are able to find fulfillment within their own abilities. Everyone wants that.

I go back to the story of Adam and Eve. Their "sin" is not disobedience. Their sin is that they turned away from God, feeling they could do better on their own. They feared God had left them limited (or incomplete). They thought they could fix that by their own power. Perhaps the Bible is the first written record of "self-help" gone wrong! Money is the forbidden fruit of our day. It gives us the illusion of power and self-determination. As long as our society has as much money available as it does people will look to themselves for fulfillment rather than God.

What does the church need? Good leaders are important, yes. But as long as people can fool themselves into thinking they can make it apart from God they will continue to fool themselves. We are all wise when we can recognize the desires of Adam and Eve also are within ourselves. When we do that we can see the tendencies and desires that drive us. Seeing that is the first step in turning to God with honesty of heart. God and God alone can bring us fulness of life. That is a step on the path to true wholeness. That is a path we can guide others to travel too.

May you feel God's presence in your life and know the wholeness, security, and love only God can provide. Blessings, Pastor Jon


SCHOOL SUPPLIES – We had a whole table of donated items for the distribution for the Victor Farmington end of summer celebration. Thank you to everyone who donated.
