Pastor's Paragraphs

If you're not in the habit of regular Bible reading let me suggest you crack open your Bible to Romans 14-15. There St. Paul writes about Christian freedom, and the appropriate use of it. His overall premise is that even though we are free in many regards we need to respect the thoughts and feelings of others. He's speaking mostly about religious practices like observing holidays and what you eat or don't eat. But I think the same thing can be applied to things like mask wearing these days. Regardless of how you feel about wearing a mask in public you do it to honor, respect, and protect those around you.

With election season fully upon us there is a full scale stirring of lots of divisive issues. While I believe there is quite a bit at stake in the upcoming election, I believe St. Paul's thoughts still apply. While the issues are more serious than personal piety the same honor and respect is due to our neighbors. Critical thinking, debate, and disagreement are all part of a healthy political process. But a Christian does all in a spirit of the grace of God.

Romans 14:7-8 contain a concise summary of the life of a Christian that is appropriate for today and every day:

"We do not live to ourselves, and we do not die to ourselves. If we live, we live to the Lord, and if we die, we die to the Lord; so then, whether we live or whether we die, we are the Lord's."




God's Work, Our Hands Sunday -Potato & Pumpkin Harvest-
